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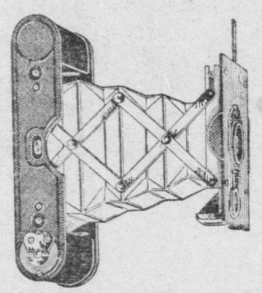

It will cost Hellam township more than \$1,000 to repair the Accomac road, damaged by the storm of a week ago. It will require several weeks to repair a stretch of that road a half mile in length. Considerable damage was also done at Accomac, a resort along the Susquehanna river. Access to that place by automobile or other conveyance is not possible at this time. Persons going to Accomac have to travel by the way of Marietta.

Mr. Kraybill, was graduated at Pennsylvania State College, and is a son of S. S. Kraybill of near Mount Joy. He has been very successful with his work.

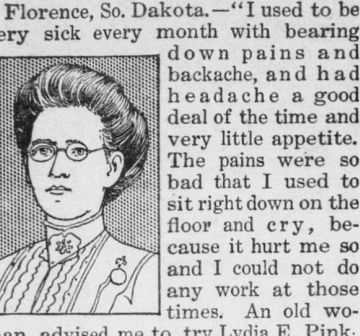

HOME HEALTH CLUB

By Dr. David H. Reeder, Chicago, Ill.

Medicine and Politics:—One of the greatest political machines ever built up in this country was organized so quietly and worked so skilfully that but few of its own members really knew that it was a political machine. As it grew more powerful, however, it became more aggressive and open in its work and some of the real doctors began to wake up.

A house cleaning that originates within the family is quite likely to be more or less effective, drastic and beneficial. So it has been with the great American Medical Association. I have never had much use for the association because it seemed to me that the whole end and aim of the organization was self service, self aggrandizement and self interest. In its reports of meetings the various papers appeared to plan out how best to advance the interests of the members and put out of business any physician who was not a member, put out of business all dealers in medicine not prescribed by their members, not because the medicines injured the people, but because their sale injured the profession.

When the real doctors wake up, real service and the true work of physicians begin to appear. At the recent annual meeting held at Atlantic City, the plan of true service to the people was declared by the newly elected president to be the new policy of the association.

Large sums of money will be spent by the association in just such work as Home Health Club has been doing for two score years, to educate the people along practical lines of sanitation, social service and general as well as physical welfare of the nation. The greatest objection to their declared policy is that they wish to dictate legislation along many lines and courses. Each new law will provide a salaried position for one of the members of the association.

When such a powerful organization reaches the point where it can forget self interest and render real and helpful service, then they will no longer inspire feeling of enmity and hostility among the people and laws of the right kind will come easily and naturally without opposition.

Tell the people what to do and how to do it in order to relieve suffering and avoid sickness. Sweating Feet:—During the hot days of the summer many people suffer with blistered toes. An intense itching is felt between the toes and when the feet are undressed at night it is found that the skin has been broken and blisters have formed between the toes that are very painful. I have found that in most cases the trouble can be wholly prevented by a simple precaution taken when the first hot days begin.

At night just before retiring pour over the feet, especially the toes, very hot water, just as hot as can be bore without scalding, dry and dust with plain talcum powder. Many of the so-called foot powders are cheap compounds and some of them are injurious. Pure plain talcum powder will not irritate but is soothing and healing. People who suffer with the feet should not wear the hosiery longer than one day without a thorough washing.

If the skin between the toes has already been broken before the treatment of hot water is applied, use the treatment just the same, but when dressing the feet next morning place small layers of absorbent cotton between the toes. This will instantly relieve the irritation and absorb the perspiration of the day. Use talcum powder freely before putting the cotton between the toes.
