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What Do You Know
The fierce mandate of the world-war lord has gone forth, and when it passes to mark the termination of the world.
What do you know? Is the Kaiser of Germany really a dictator? Or is he merely a many-sided and versatile mischief-maker. At any rate he occupies the centre of the stage and looms large in the public eye—such a public as he thoroughly appreciates, for the eyes of three continents are upon him.
In judging the conduct of this Imperial War Meddler many facts of historical import have to be borne in mind. The picturesque Macaulay in his charming essay on Frederick the Great, points out with more fidelity to fact than generally characterises his writings, (for is he not borne out by the cynical Voltaire?) that the father of the Prussian petty monarch stinted his already sparse provision for his court table that he might purchase the services of some gigantic grenadier. So early in the family career of the German nation—before an army was looked upon as an imperial playing thing. Frederick of Prussia, with the army his father had pinched to provide, managed to extend his dominions until they comprised territories more worthy of the title "kingdom," for he raked in all those electoral divisions and petty dukedoms which played so great a part in the politics of the Middle Ages, stopping short only of the Hapsburg domains, the seat of the ancient Holy Roman Empire itself. After Bavaria, Saxony, Silesia and the more western domains of the Germanic peoples came the theft of part of Poland and later, under Wilhelm I and the short-lived Frederick Wilhelm, the annexation of Alsace and Lorraine. With such illustrious examples of land-grabbing, is it any wonder if the latest Hohenzollern, possessing an army which outvies the wildest dreams of his grenadier-loving great-great-grandpa, if he should roll his eyes around in order to see what new territory could be made subject by means of this war-machine, and thus play up to the traditions of his house.
No doubt he thinks he is intended by Fate to bring under one rule—iron-hard, semi-military rule, it is even on a footing of peace—the whole of the German-speaking people. Austria, ah! yes, with her decaying dynasty which has supplied so many rulers and consorts of rulers to European nations in past days—what if this people could be made to fall in love with a more vigorous monarch than the aged Franz Josef, and falling his house, be content to submit to and become part of the German Empire?
Then "Perfidious Albion" as his neighbors and old enemies, the French once termed their old-time foe and present fast friend and ally—England; how hateful that she should have so many colonies, outlets for the excess population and native energies while Germany has only a part of equatorial or tropical Africa and an island (Madagascar) near the Indian Ocean, while America, where their sons learnt too much freedom of thought, has opened wide her doors to the industrious Deutscher.
Can one wonder, with all these facts in evidence, the Kaiser (as one of our townsmen aptly said the other day) has gone about with a chip on his shoulder. Somewhere, out of the ruins of warring states, some pickings of empire surely should be gathered by one who deems himself in an unparalleled position to dictate. He has meddled in Turkish, Moroccan, Tripolitan, Venezuelan (doesn't he hanker after a coaling port nearer the Canal Zone than his Polynesian island) and other affairs; but now great powers are calling his bluff, and it will strain even his enormous war resources to meet the combined forces, naval and military, of Russia and France, and now England. What will be the outcome? Certainly ruin, blood, tears and poverty which follow taxation for war. Let him take heed lest his modern Thor's hammer, which in his heathen ancestor's mythology, was supposed to return to the hand of its wielder, does not recoil upon his head and crush him, and he be compelled by his combined foes to haul down his national emblem, the eagle, and adopt in its stead the symbol from the fable of old Aesop, the ass in the lion's skin.

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Old Resident Reminds
The following very interesting article appeared in the Lancaster New Era:
Lancaster county has the well-established reputation as being the garden spot of the Union, and I want to ask the readers, of large and small means, have you really seen it? The facilities by auto cars and electric cars are within the reach of many. There are many points of interest easily accessible. One of the grand sights at this time of year is Chickies Rock, on the electric car line, between Columbia and Marietta. The rock overlooks Donegal bordering on the Susquehanna, with scenery unequalled for grandeur and pleasing to the eye. On the rock, the reticent General Grant became enthusiastic with the vista unfolded to him. Theodore Hilton here received an inspiration for his writings. At the base of the rock was the home of Prof. S. S. Haldeman, a linguist of international reputation, whose daughter married Count Flegmessy, a Hungarian patriot. The late Chris. Maes spent a day there and delighted his friends with his rich fund of political reminiscences.
Looking over Donegal we see the Cameron estate, which now contains 600 acres of as fertile land as can be found anywhere, and the buildings in keeping with the surroundings. The stately mansion adjoin the historic Donegal springs was the Mecca for statesmen, jurists, politicians, and journalists during Simon Cameron's residence there. Not a Presidential candidate was selected for many years that did not have the impress of the conferences held in this hospitable mansion. Cleveland owed his election by some of the leaders failing to take the advice of the far-sighted Cameron. The estate is now the home of his son, ex-Senator J. Donald Cameron. One of the incidents of Senator Don's career was his management of the campaign of General Hartranft against C. A. Buckalew. It was a stormy battle, and it is conceded that Senator Don's unflinching courage won the battle. A further political record for Donegal is the high positions its citizens were honored with. Simon Cameron, Secretary of War, U. S. Senator, Minister to Russia; J. Donald Cameron, Secretary of War, U. S. Senator and at one period president of the Northern Central Railroad.
Residents to Donegal that were not natives held positions as follows: Henry M. Watts, Minister to Austria; Ethelbert Watts, now Consul in Belgium; John Steel Twells, Consul at Naples.
One of the interesting views from the rock is the ancient town of Marietta. Not many years ago it was the centre of a large and flourishing business in lumber and flour. Hundreds of rafts, with their crews, would find a haven here. Lumber manufacturers from the East would meet the owners of the rafts and negotiate the sales. The leading stores were compelled to have day and night service to pack the goods for the up-river customers. The iron business at one time assumed large proportions. There were six blast furnaces and one rolling mill. All have been abandoned owing to modern conditions they could not cope with.
Following the Donegal spring to the Duffy estate, we come to the park beautified by the late Col. Jas. Duffy. The dinners to the Farmers' Clubs and guests were elaborate. The writer remembers a dinner that was served by Finelli, the noted Philadelphia caterer and the dispenser of fried oysters that all the noted chefs of this day have been unable to discover his secret method. Augustine also served in this park. Among the guests that were there frequently were C. A. Dana, of the New York Sun; Thomas Scott and A. J. Cassatt, of the Pennsylvania Railroad; Samuel J. Randall, Speaker of the House; Geo. Childs, owner of the Ledger; Senator Thos. A. Bayard of Delaware; General U. S. Grant, President. The Lancaster contingent were James L. Reynolds, W. B. Fordney, Sr., Samuel H. Reynolds, John A. Hiestand, W. U. Hensel, J. Hay Brown and a few others. I cannot at this moment recall. I never heard of any one, having an invitation, refusing on account of a press of business. I want to call the attention of your readers to a matter that made a profound impression on me. I happened to see Col. Duffy, James L. Reynolds and W. B. Fordney, Sr. All of them were in, and proportioned men that would attract attention anywhere. If this trio were alive, and with James Buchanan, could be seen in pairs walking in Lancaster, imagine the attention they would receive. Their dimpled bearing would have made an impression. Lancaster in days gone by had a number of men prominent in their professions that had a commanding presence. The brilliant men of this age are smaller in stature. Some one may explain better than I can.
