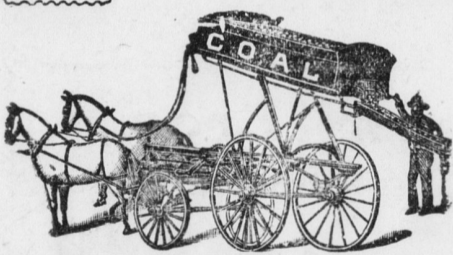

Agent of the County Bureau, Gives Very Interesting Information on Topics That Should Interest All Farmers

It will generally be found preferable and desirable to cut clover at least once during the year of seeding. When sown in the spring with wheat, rye or oats it will make a very rapid growth after these crops are harvested if conditions are normally favorable. It is not at all unusual to see the large number of plants in the new clover field develop blossoms and seed during August and September. This reproduction is a weakening process and marks the end of the life of the plant. Numbers of clover plants are so weakened that the following years yield will suffer. By clipping the new clover at least once during the latter part of August seed production will be arrested and the plant vitality will be conserved for next year.

When clover is clipped it may be made into hay during the first year but this practice is not very satisfactory. On the other hand the growth should not be allowed to continue so long that it will smother beneath the clipped material. When cutting it is well to remove the rackbearer in order to have the grass fall evenly. The cutting should be made rather high rather than low. This will not cause such abrupt change which always tends to have a weakening influence.

Clipping also will remove many weeds and weed seeds which would surely prove a menace later. Again the cut stubble grass, etc., provides a protection which lessens the damage from winter injury.

The practice of clipping clover has become quite general in localized communities. Last year some farmers made as many as three clippings. Results this season do not seem to justify more than two clippings when the value of the additional labor is considered.

While our numerous summer rains have in a measure prevented the loss of ammonia or nitrogen into the air from our unprotected barn yards, they have permitted this same material to flow away in a small discolored streamlet from the lower level of the manure pile. Thousands of these same little streamlets are annually carrying thousands of dollars worth of fertility from the "Garden Spot." It is quite questionable whether the 75,000 cattle fed by our farmers annually return to the farmer the amount of fertilizer calculated.

Forty per cent of the nitrogen content, five per cent of the phosphoric and sixty per cent of the potash of ordinary barn yard manure is found in the liquid portion of the excrement. A part of the fertilizer constituents of the solid portion is rendered soluble through oxidation during the life of the ordinary manure pile. This would make the possibility for loss by leaching greater than is indicated above, by farmers in active livestock sections.

It is now being recognized that the manure pit is a practical asset to the farm equipment. In Lancaster county however, its use is still foreign. A pit can be constructed easily and cheaply by the farmer himself if he has had any experience in concrete construction. The pit should be so located that it is easily accessible and at such level that all liquid manures will drain into it. Whenever the pit becomes filled and at a convenient time the liquid contents are pumped by a hand pump into a tank wagon and hauled to the field. Crop results from the use of liquid manure will justify the expense of construction in a very short time. The writer was especially interested in the use of liquid manure from a pit in a meadow upon a Chester county farm. About 50 cows were pastured on 8 acres during the entire summer. Without the use of repeated applications of liquid questioning whether one fourth of this number could have been kept.

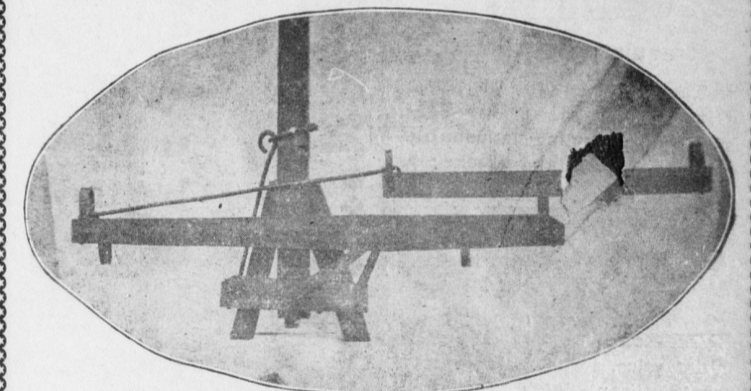
