VERY VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR THE FARMERS

Care in Hog Breeding Pays Big Money

The Restoring of the Fertility of the Soil—Results from Good Sires Sulphur Material

Placing fresh butter into strong brine and allowing it to remain until it has absorbed sufficient salt to preserve it is one of the best ways to salt butter. In this way there is no danger that the butter will not be salted evenly and thoroughly without leaving any hard, gritty pieces of salt in it to disgust the consumer. Ohio is about to embark on the construction of what it calls a system of market roads which is to cover the entire state. It figures that by the expenditure of \$3,000,000 to \$3,500,000 a year for ten years it will be able to bring the system to completion. If it does so, it will have to be luckier or wiser than New York state has been.

Lime-sulphur is the important material for the first spraying before the buds open. This material is especially serviceable in the control of San Jose scale, but even if scale is not present, it is well worth while making the lime-sulphur application as a precaution against scale infestation and because of its invigorating action upon the tree.

One county in Iowa where the use of pure bred dairy sires was introduced 20 years ago now produces 7,400 pounds of creamery butter per square mile each year. This is a decided contrast to those districts scrub bulls are still in use, of where beef bulls are used in dairy herds. Because the result of using a well-bred sire cannot be seen for a year or two, beginners are inclined to become discouraged. One case is known where a Hereford sire was being used in a herd of high grade Guernseys because the man who had the Hereford bull for sale said they were pretty good milkers. Such changes and mixing of blood never improve, but invariably weaken the stock. The first cost of a good dairy bull calf seems heavy to a man not familiar with them.

Where lands have been "cropped to death," as some plain people aptly term it, live stock farming is the surest, cheapest and quickest method of restoring its fertility. In live stock farming the crops raised on the farm are grown primarily for the purpose of feeding one or more classes of live stock, and but little is sold except animal products. On the other hand concentrated feeding stuffs are purchased for feeding the farm animals, which is to the amount of fertility returned to the land in manure. Since the animal products sold do not, as a general rule, contain large quantities of fertilizing ingredients, it is easy to rapidly increase the fertility of land by this system of farming.

Hogs are peculiarly susceptible to environment and rapidly improve or retrograde through the infusion of good or inferior blood. Because of the ease with which they take advantage of improved conditions and the wonderful improvement to be noted in form and size, no other class of live stock furnishes more satisfaction to the conscientious breeder. He has many different qualities to choose from, all good, but not all alike suited in temperament to one locality or one method of management. Then, again different tastes and the breeder must choose the breed that most nearly conforms to his particular purpose and preference, remembering always to select animals showing strong in the points and characteristics of the breed chosen, says the Orange Judd Farmer. In breeding for improvement in any variety much can be accomplished. Improvements may be discernible with each effort if rightly conducted and a breeder may reasonably expect satisfactory results in molding a hog to his own ideas within three or four generations. With such rapid progress swine breeding proves extremely fascinating but great danger lies hidden in such rapid progress. Stimulated by each pronounced improvement of the shape of ear, length of leg, color or formation of body, the breeder must not overlook the fact that the farmer is essentially practical. He cares little whether the ear has an artistic droop or stands upright, whether the hair is straight, curly, black, white or red. He wants a hog that will produce the largest amount of revenue in the shortest time with the least expenditure. To this end it stands the breeder in hand to have for his ideals a hog large in size, strong in bone, with well-shaped hams and shoulders, one that will fatten quickly and cheaply.

One would not of course, even think of the Pope being in an intemperate man and it is easily understood that his age is beginning to tell against his physical endurance, while, it is also known that he is a sufferer from influenza or what is properly called Hay Fever. Those of you who read my recent article on that distressing malady can readily understand what may be the cause.

As a rule the word temperance makes us think instantly of liquors, but there is a vast amount of intemperance in the world indulged in by people who were never under the influence of liquor in their lives. Intemperance in work, worry, greed, desire, eating and even drinking milk. I knew a man who was on a strict diet at a sanitarium. He was hungry and asked if he could eat oranges knowing that the fruit was regularly prescribed for cases like his. The attendant told him, "Yes, eat as many as you like." He ate 36 in one day and nearly killed himself. As he was recovering from the effects of that, he one day, drank double the regular allowance of milk and again was made severely ill. While I believe that the whole world would be the gainer if the production of alcoholic liquors should forever cease, I know that intemperance would not at the same time come to an end, but it would help mightily.

School Board Meets—Local Lads Kill a 40-Inch Copperhead

Paul Maloney and Earl Boyles killed a copperhead snake on the York county shore that measured a trifle over forty inches. The young men had quite a time to dispatch the reptile who sprang at them several times. This is the fifth copperhead snake killed in that section this year.

The many friends of Henry Graybill, a former resident of this place, but now residing at Johnstown, will be sorry to learn of his serious illness, and his death is only a matter of time. Mr. Graybill is past 70 years of age and was one of the most prominent residents here years ago. He served in the Civil war.

The regular meeting of the school board was held Thursday evening with all members present. President Mueller presided. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The secretary's report showed 347 pupils in school. Bills amounting to about \$200 were ordered paid. The treasurer's and tax collector's reports were read and approved. Three liens were ordered filed on the properties of the Cushman sisters, Elizabeth Gould and Dr. Franklin estate. All scholars intending to attend school in the borough will be charged the same rate as last year, and tuition must be paid in full for last year and a month in advance on the present term. Daniel G. Heilman was re-elected trustee officer and the compulsory school law will be rigidly enforced. Dr. H. A. Mowery and H. C. Windolph, representing the board of health, were present. After some discussion, it was found advisable to close the schools until September 8 and have the buildings thoroughly fumigated so that there may be no trouble arise from any contagious disease, from which there was a death at the eastern end of town on Monday. After a number of minor things were discussed, the board adjourned.
