No Frost This Week

Washington, Sept. 13—Following is the weekly weather forecast for the forthcoming week:

The weather will be unsettled, with showers the first part of the week in the great central valleys and the region of the great lakes, and by Tuesday showery weather will probably set in over the eastern and southern states and on the north Pacific coast. Except as stated above, the weather will be generally fair. Temperatures will average near the seasonal average in the southern states and below normal elsewhere, with frosts probably along the northern border and in the northwestern states and the Rocky Mountain and plateau regions. There are no indications at the present time of a disturbance in the West Indies.

An Immense Yield

The eastern end of the county is surely producing a big crop of potatoes this year and thousands of bushels are being shipped to the Philadelphia markets weekly. One man near Christiansa has a yield of 1,300 bushels. The selling price was 50 cents a bushel and they are so plenty that they dropped five cents last week. The farmers immediately quit delivering and they are about right as they should never have less than 50 cents a bushel.
