POLLING PLACE CHANGED

The East Ward Voters Will Vote at Exchange Hotel Hereafter

A petition was presented to court on Saturday asking to have the polling place in the East Ward changed. The McGinnis hotel, and earlier still, H. L. Mooney's, has been the polling place for many years. This building was recently damaged by fire and as it will not be rebuilt at present, it was deemed best to have the poll moved to the Exchange Hotel building. The Court granted the change.

The petition as filed, follows: In the Court of Quarter Sessions of the County of Lancaster, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the petition of the undersigned citizens and qualified electors of the East Ward of the Borough of Mount Joy respectfully represents, that the polling place in the said election district has recently been destroyed by fire and will not be rebuilt in time for the holding of the next election. Wherefore, your petitioners respectfully pray your Honorable Court change the election poll in the said district to the Exchange Hotel, which is a commodious building and well suited for the purpose of the election and located at the northwest corner of East Main and Barbara streets, in the immediate vicinity and not over one hundred and fifty feet removed from the polling place which has been destroyed, and they will ever pray, etc.
