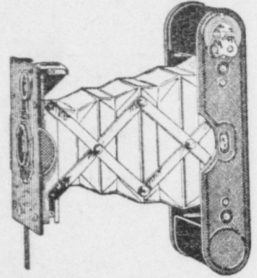

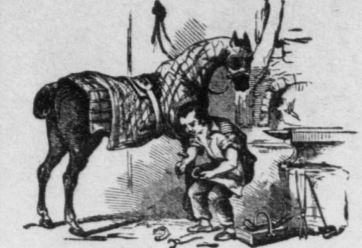

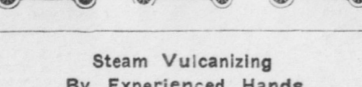

GROWERS MEET AT MASTERTONVILLE

Reports Indicate That the Prices This Year Will Be Higher

A group of twelve tobacco growers met with R. L. Kimbrough of the Seed Leaf Tobacco Growers Co., Thursday at Mastertonville and talked over the crop conditions and also heard a report on the status of the company. The attendance was small because of the fact that many were busy cutting tobacco. Those present reported the marketing of the crops in their vicinity and the quality of the same.

In this connection it was stated that two farmers who had last year sold their tobacco for five and two and four and two respectively had this year been offered eight and two and seven and a half and two for the 1912 crop, and that the former offers had been accepted by the growers to whom it was made. From this the men at the meeting last night felt that the price this year for the same grade of tobacco would be double what it was last year.

UP GOES CUP CHEESE

A Manheim Township Farmer's Wife Finds War to Have Far-Reaching Effect
