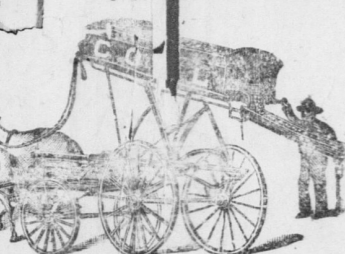

## Farmers Column

### VERY VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR THE FARMERS

#### Cleanliness in Handling of Milk Essential—Care of the Tree Before Planting—Agricultural Products Destroyed by Insects

Fresh green bone ground so that it does not have an opportunity to spoil; that is, ground as the hens will eat it, is one of the very best feeds any season.

Cows are nervous timid and sensitive and they suffer with homesickness. The newly purchased cow is apt to fall off in her milk flow for a time until she gets used to new surroundings.

The summer is rapidly passing, a gentle reminder to poultry keepers that another winter will soon be with us. It is never too early to start, add every advantage should be taken of favorable conditions to put the poultry house in order, so that when winter does come it will not find us unprepared.

If eggs, while hatching, become soiled, and it is necessary to clean them, a basin of warm water at a temperature of 103 degrees Fahrenheit should be used but not above this a little less being better than a greater degree. The eggs should be put into this water and the dirt gently removed after soaking and washing with the hands then dried with a cloth and put back in the nest, which should be first renewed with clean hay. If not badly soiled they may be cleaned by gently scraping with a knife or with the fingers. Care is necessary to avoid cracking the shell or jarring the egg, as such an injury will destroy the possibility of a hatch.

After much computing, the experts of the department of agriculture at Washington have set the value of the agricultural products destroyed each year in the United States by insect pests at eight hundred million dollars, says Youth's Companion. That vast sum may be called the insect tax paid by the farmers. It is much larger than the tax paid each year for the education of American children and much larger than the amount at which the buildings and endowments of the six hundred colleges in this country are valued. It is twice as large as the amount lost in the San Francisco fire and three or four times as large as the combined bonded and floating debts of all states of the Union.

In digging a tree, preserve as many of the roots as possible, especially the fine roots which feed the larger ones. Do not let these roots dry in the sun or wind. They should be protected with burlap, canvas, or straw until they are set in the ground. This is especially true of evergreens. Exposure of the roots to the sun or wind for one minute will set the resin in the root and stop further development of the plant. This is a matter that does not seem to be well understood, or at least heeded, by our tree planters. Thousands of evergreens are destroyed each year by careless handling, either in the nursery or, as is the usual case, by the planter. One cannot be too careful in handling either the evergreen or the hardwood trees to keep the roots from drying. In the handling of milk, both for home consumption on the farm and also for shipment to the various markets, too much care cannot be taken in keeping it absolutely free from contact with anything in which there is a possibility of being germs of disease. The following paragraph amply illustrates the deadly suits of carelessness and should be a warning to all who have to do with the handling of milk. "A milkman near London pricked his finger with a thorn. It festered, but he refused to give up his work until he was obliged to go into a hospital. At the same time an epidemic of diphtheria broke out in the neighborhood, an epidemic which eventually caused 117 deaths. The doctors went at first at a loss to trace the cause, but presently they found that the germs came from milk supplied from the farm where the man with the pricked finger worked. Then they examined the man and found that his poisoned hand reeked with germs of this deadly disease."

### Little Talks on Health and Hygiene by Samuel G. Dixon

The brain's power grows long after the maximum of physical strength has been reached.

For the man of advanced years simple diet and regularity of habits are essential. The physiological processes are less active and many structures lack the elasticity of youth and should not be subjected to undue strain.

Tolerant age is more than a match for intolerant youth and the mental poise which should come with advancing years has a decided bearing on the physical well-being and mental power.

The infirmities of age are often less of a handicap to the accomplishment of serious and effective work than the erratic vitality of youth.
