HOME HEALTH CLUB

A FALL COLD:—As cold weather approaches it is the general custom of people who are not in perfect health to "catch a severe cold" which is hard to overcome. It seems to keep getting a firmer hold and the winter comes on with the cold still troubling and a deep seated catarrhal discharge or a troublesome cough. Why?

If we know the reason for certain things or conditions we can, if we will, guard against their evils. A few years ago, at one of the agricultural experiments stations, a test of conditions and health was made upon a certain number of cattle, by dividing them into three lots as nearly equal in health and condition as possible. The first lot was comfortably housed in a well ventilated barn and all properly cared for, fed and watered and the barn cleaned every morning.

The second lot were left in an open lot which had sheds that would keep off the snow and rain as well as the wind from the north and west. They were fed the same as the first lot. The third lot was left in an open field, where the hills and the bare branches of the trees was the only protection. They also were fed the same rations as the first lot in the barn.

The first lot suffered severely with colds and required the attention of the veterinarian from time to time, while the second lot was troubled but little with colds, yet they required some attention. The third lot, left in the open field appeared in perfect health throughout the entire winter and in the spring were in much better condition than either of the others. Do you see the answer to Fall Colds?

In large cities it has been found necessary to establish the outdoor schools for weak, sickly children, for children that take cold easily or have weak lungs and a tendency toward consumption. The strong, robust, healthy children can stand the perils of artificially heated schoolrooms. Quite a number of them will contract tuberculosis and other diseases, but the sick children that go to school out doors get strong and well, they seldom are troubled with the many children's diseases.

Can you now answer the question of Fall Colds? You do not catch cold as long as the doors and windows are all left open both day and night. It's only when the fresh, pure air and sunshine are shut out that the colds and coughs and catarrh and consumption get in.

I am one of the trustees of the Children's Tuberculosis Society. I love children and I have covered about 15 fine buildings at Mexico, and one of the things we did when we for tubercular children would build splendid porches so it would not at any time be necessary to sit indoors. The place is now open and any poor child is free to go there where he will be kept in God's pure air and sunshine, fed, clothed, and taught just the same as though he was the possessor of unlimited wealth. Those who are able to pay will pay, of course, but to the poor tubercular child it is as free as the air and the sunshine.

Don't be in a hurry about shutting up the house in the fall. If its cold and raining, build up the fires and put on more clothing, but don't shut out the pure air. Be sure to clean the stove and the furnace and the radiators thoroughly before the heat is turned on and let the furnace run a few days with the windows and doors wide open and then you can gradually accustom yourself to the poor heated air of indoors without so much risk, but don't forget that there is life and health in the pure fresh air and sunshine and there is sickness, catarrh, colds, consumption and death in superheated unventilated homes, schools, churches, etc.
