County Growers Association Passes a Resolution Not to Sell for Less Than Full Value

Lancaster County Tobacco Growers are determined to hold out for good prices for their 1914 crop, one of the best ever raised.

The following resolution was passed without a dissenting voice: "Whereas, it has been developed at the meeting of the Lancaster County Tobacco Growers' Association held Monday afternoon in the Chamber of Commerce rooms at Lancaster.

Resolved, That this association would advise the tobacco growers of Lancaster County not to be in a hurry to sell their crops at low prices and especially not to be in a hurry to sell tobacco on the poles.

Considerable discussion preceded the passing of opinion was that the grower who sold his tobacco on the poles was injuring himself and also his neighbor.

By not sticking together the growers harm each other was forcibly brought out at the meeting. The grower that sells his crop early at a low price, such as 5 and 2 cents, established a precedent for his fellow planters, who, fearing that they will be left, sell valuable crops at a low price.

R. L. Kimbrough, manager of the Seed Leaf Growers' Company, stated that he had studied the situation in the County, and found the crop very good. The Growers' Company, he said, had finished sampling the 1913 crop and had found it an excellent burner and sweet.

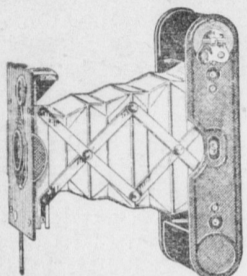
