

C. E. ANNUAL CONVENTION

Was Held at Marietta Thursday Over 100 Delegates Present

The annual convention of the Christian Endeavor Societies in Lancaster county, held on Thursday in Zion Reformed Church, Marietta, was one of the most successful yet held by the organization.

The convention opened at 9:15 with a praise service led by Mr. J. G. Dailey, of Philadelphia. Mr. Dailey is a musician of ability and the writer of a number of hymns and tunes.

The devotional service was in charge of Rev. William J. Lowe, pastor of the Maytown Reformed Church. He read as a Scripture lesson First Corinthians, 13th chapter, after which he led the convention in prayer.

Mr. Dailey then sang a solo from his collection of hymns "The Love Song," the audience joining in singing the chorus.

The address of welcome to the convention was delivered by Mr. G. H. Pinkerton of Marietta, in behalf of Zion Reformed Church and the town.

The response in behalf of the delegates was given by Mr. W. P. Riggs, of White Rock, Pa.

After another song the convention sermon was preached by Rev. G. D. Batdorf, pastor of Covenant United Brethren Church, Lancaster. The subject of his sermon was "Victory of Faith."

After singing, led by Prof. Dailey, the County President, Mr. J. H. Epler, of Elizabethtown, called for the reports of officers and committees.

As President, Mr. Epler reported having visited a number of societies, attended rallies and organization of new societies.

Secretary Miss Anna C. Sherts, of Lancaster, reported two societies disbanded; 28 societies sending in full reports showing 1,516 active, 118 honorary and 77 associate members; 41 societies did not send in reports in full.

Treasurer, Rev. D. E. Copeland, of Mountville, reported a balance at the beginning of the year of \$73.50; receipts during the year of \$50.26; expenses, \$62.68; balance at present, \$60.18.

Junior Superintendent, Miss Erel Graybill of Lancaster, reported 579 members; contributions to missions, \$130.81; to benevolence, \$173.74. Other work of different kinds was done among aged, shut-ins, mission etc.; three intermediate societies reported.

The report of the Good Citizenship Committee was sent in by Rev. C. D. Rishel of Mount Joy.

The Missionary Superintendent, Mr. D. E. Rohrer, of East Petersburg, read a very interesting report, telling of missionary literature sent out, etc.; 41 societies reported work done along the line of missions. Over \$600 was contributed to missions; four mission study classes were reported.

A very interesting report of the State Convention held in Uniontown last July was read by Miss Zahla Leaman of Lancaster.

At this time the President appointed committees on resolutions, nominations and auditing.

Neville and Strasburg extended invitations for the 1915 convention. It was decided that next year the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Lancaster County Union should be observed.

State Secretary McCrory was then introduced and presented some of the State campaigns of the convention.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session opened with a song service, led by Prof. Dailey. Rev. J. M. Walters of Ephrata led the devotional service, reading as a Scripture lesson Second Timothy 2:1-19.

The address of the afternoon was delivered by Rev. J. Rauch Stein, of Bethlehem. His subject was, "The Essential Elements in Christian Endeavor."

The Committee on Nominations reported the following: President, Mr. J. H. Epler, Elizabethtown; Vice President, Rev. E. E. Sensenig, Marietta; Secretary, Miss Anna C. Sherts, Lancaster; Treasurer, Rev. D. E. Copeland, Mountville; Junior Superintendent, Rev. Wm. J. Lowe, Maytown; Good Citizenship, Rev. C. D. Rishel, Mt. Joy; Missionary Committee, D. E. Rohrer, East Petersburg; Press, W. P. Riggs, White Rocks, Pa.

By ballot it was decided to hold the 1915 county convention at Strasburg.

Miss Blanche B. Bonine, missionary to Mexico drew for her audience a vivid picture of conditions in Mexico.

The State Executive Committee were in session during the afternoon for the transaction of the business pertaining to the State Union.

The closing of the evening officers were

Miss Gertrude Schwab to lead in the devotional service. After a season of prayer in which a large number of the Endeavorers took part, Romans 12 was read as a scripture lesson. After singing two more hymns, led by Prof. Dailey, Dr. C. H. Chain, State President, was introduced and spoke on the Standing of C. E. in Pennsylvania.

The ladies of Zion's Church, under the direction of Mr. Norman Pickel, prepared for the visiting Endeavorers a bounteous dinner and supper, which were enjoyed to the full by the delegates.

The Registration Committee reported 110 delegates who registered, 51 Reformed, 24 Presbyterian, 18 Lutheran, 7 United Brethren, 2 Methodists, 2 Church of God, 1 Episcopalian, 1 Church of the Brethren, 1 Baptist and 9 State officials.

JUST A FEW FACTS

Several Good Reasons Why That School Loan Should Carry in November

Here are a few pointers that we sincerely hope voters will remember when they go to the polls on November 4 to vote on our proposed \$10,000 school loan.

Do you know that there are exactly 90 pupils in the High School here and exactly that many in the High school at Elizabethtown? Do you know that Elizabethtown's room, floor space, breathing space, etc., fills every requirement of the law? Do you know that their room is exactly twice as large as our High school room? Knowing these facts, can you realize where we stand? Just think that over.

Do you know that Dr. Mowery, hygiene inspector for the state, recently visited our schools, and condemned our High school, telling Prof. Roudabush that there was just double the number of pupils in the High school that the room will legally accommodate? In regards to this matter he said he will wait until after the election to report these existing conditions to the state, inasmuch as the Board is now showing an inclination to remedy the crowded conditions.

If the loan is defeated and the state compels our School Board to make ample provision, you can rest assured it will be done, but if they are obliged to do it in that manner you can prepare to meet a higher tax rate. A loan sanctioned by the people can be paid almost any time but when the Board is forced to make a loan, they must levy a direct tax in order to pay for same. Do you get it?

Furthermore, are you aware of the fact that five years ago Columbia had the only first grade high school in the county outside of Lancaster City but today Ephrata, Litz and Manheim are also in that class and Elizabethtown very soon will be. Can any conscientious citizen that has the interests of our town and its people at heart, object to this move for the better?

We have as good a town as there is in the county in every particular and in various instances we stand shoulders above our sister boroughs, so don't let our public schools be "down foot" in this class. We think its time to "trap" and especially since we have extended our borough limits.

PTOMAIN POISONING

Little Talks on Health and Hygiene by Samuel G. Dixon

Ptomaine poison causes a serious disturbance of the digestive organs due to the products of germ life. Generally speaking, ptomaines are the result of decomposition of food stuffs. This is caused by bacteria in the process of their growth a poison is produced which effects a violent disturbance if introduced into the digestive system.

Sausage, decomposed fish, cheese, ice cream, milk, canned meats and vegetables are the food stuffs most commonly responsible for ptomaine poisoning. Cooking will not always destroy the ptomaines in food stuffs. It kills the bacteria but the poisonous substances will remain.

Unfortunately our sense of taste in the majority of instances does not warn us of the presence of these poisons. This is often due to the common practice of over-seasoning our food stuffs and the excessive use of condiments. Also it is the practice of many canners to add preservatives which makes it possible for them to use decomposed meats or vegetables. If foods for canning are properly inspected before their preparation and the decayed portion eliminated, they can be made to keep without the addition of injurious preservatives.

Ptomaine poisoning as a rule develops a few hours after eating, and progresses rapidly.

In the treatment of ptomaine poisoning the first essential is to wash out the stomach and empty the intestinal canal of as much of the decomposed food as possible. These things may be done while awaiting the arrival of the physician.

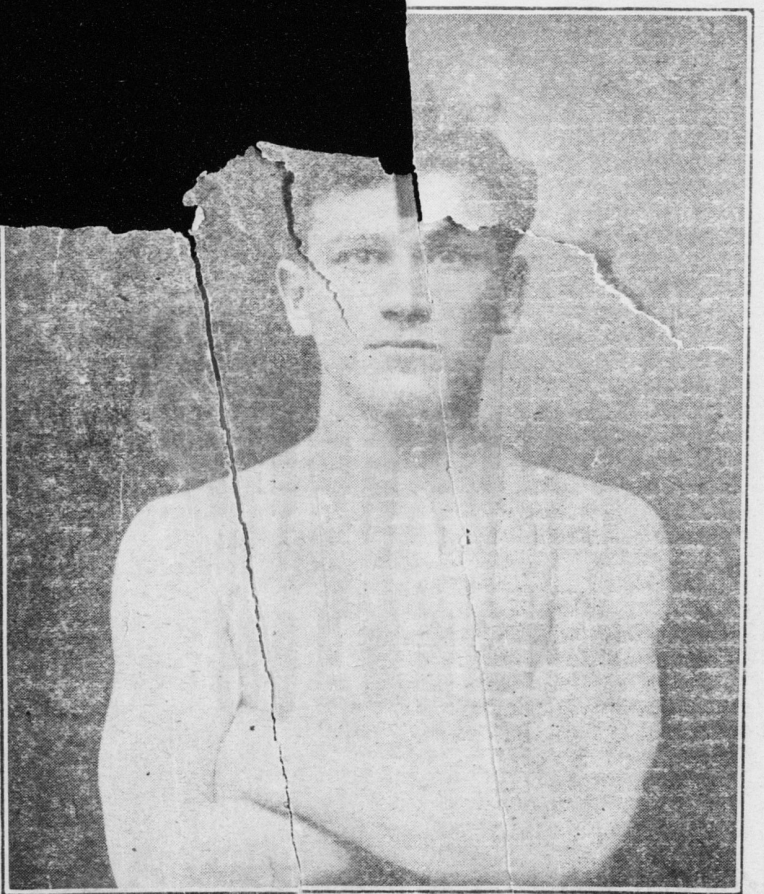

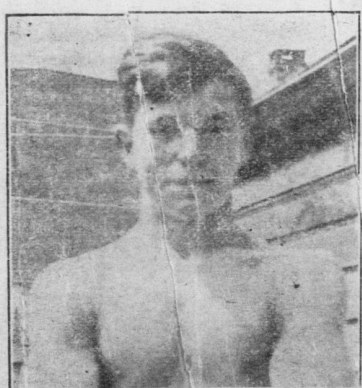


LYDIA E. PINKHAM
