Polluted Well Water Causes Another Death at Elizabethtown

Polluted well water caused the death of two men in a family, whose wives are now lying in the General Hospital, with the same malady. An infant son is also with his mother. Martin Galebach, 20 years old, a young married man, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Galebach of Elizabethtown, died at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon in the General Hospital. His father-in-law, Elmer Ebersole, died two weeks ago in the General Hospital from the same disease. His wife and her mother are now in the hospital with the dread malady. An infant son of the dead man is also at the institution.

Besides the young man's parents, twelve brothers and sisters survive. The remains were taken to the late home on Bainbridge street, Elizabethtown, Friday evening. The funeral was held Monday morning at 10 o'clock. Interment was made at Cornwall.

the poultry business neglect their stock during the winter months. They do not yield readily to the influences. Such beginners are successful in the poultry business. Constant care, good feed, fresh water are absolutely necessary at all times. This holds true until the time the chicks are hatched. The amount of silage to feed a cow depends upon the capacity of the cow to consume feed. She should be fed as much as she will clean up without waste when consumed along with her hay and grain. Raise or buy the amount until the proper quantity is ascertained. Generally speaking, a good cow should be just full of her appetite. If she refuses to eat her feed it should be reduced at once.

Sunlight is one of the best and cheapest disinfectants at our disposal and we should take advantage of this fact at every opportunity. In the construction of barns or shelters for kind for animals, ample provision should be made for the admission of the maximum amount of sunlight. Southern exposure is desirable, that is, having the majority of the windows facing the south. The warmth this provides in cold weather is desirable and much of the excessive heat in summer can be avoided by providing suitable curtains or screens. Most disease germs are easily killed by direct sunlight, as has been repeatedly shown by experiments.

When a crop on a tree is too large for normal maturity, thinning is of value, and should always be given. Under such conditions it increases the size of the fruits; avoids breakage of the tree, reduces drain on both tree and soil by avoiding unnecessary seed production; and probably increases quality by affording opportunity for normal development. It also doubtless tends to increase the crop of succeeding years, though this has not yet been actually proved experimentally. When needed, thinning should be done as soon as possible after the June crop is largely over. In some localities, later thinnings are also made as the season progresses, and special attention should be given to the removal of defective fruits, so that the crop at picking time is practically all first grade.

The mother's milk should be fed the first week, beginning when the calf is 24 to 36 hours old. The milk must be fresh and warm, about ninety five to one hundred degrees Fahrenheit, and must always be fed from a clean pail, preferably a tin pail. A wooden pail is too hard to keep sweet and clean. The second week whole milk from any cow may be fed, and the third week, if the calf is in good health and growing nicely, the change to skim milk may be begun. Do not make the mistake of feeding more skim-milk simply because the cream is removed. The whole milk contains about as much protein as the calf can handle and when skim-milk is fed in large quantities the calf gets more than he can use, and as a consequence a sick calf is the result. The change from whole milk to skim milk must be gradual; from one-half to one and one-half pounds a day, depending upon the size and vigor of calf. To an average calf, two weeks old, we would feed about twelve pounds a day of whole milk. The first day of the third week, or when it is desirable to begin the change, the daily feed would be eleven pounds of whole milk and two pounds of skim-milk, and so on until the complete change is made. It is just as essential to feed the skim-milk warm as the whole milk, although when the calf gets larger and stronger, six to ten weeks old, a gradual change to cold milk may be made. Allow the calf a clean, airy paddock or box stall in which to get exercise.
