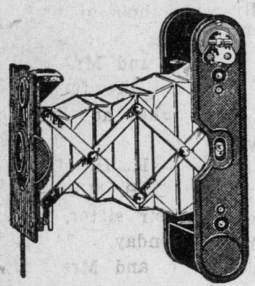

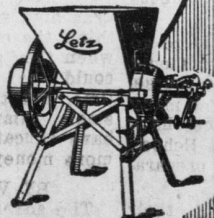

Printed Stationery

Neatly printed letter heads and
envelopes add much to the influence
and dignity of a letter, besides in-
suring correct rendering of name and
post office. While a farmer's corre-
spondence is not usually as extensive
as that of a business house, it is
equally important that a letter should
be neat and correct. Like lawyers
and business men, not all farmers
write the most legible hand and it is
frequently difficult, if not impossible,
to decipher a signature or the name
of a post office thus causing mutual
loss and annoyance. The cost of 500
printed letter heads and envelopes
is little if any more than the same
amount of stationery would be if
bought in small lots, and they can be
procured in any place having a print-
ing press. This number would last
the average farmer a long time. Be-
fore you have them printed, hold a
family consultation and give the farm
a name if it has not already been
done. If the farm has the individ-
uality it should have, it is as
worthy of an appropriate name as a
man. The correspondence from a
farm with a name, written on print-
ed letter heads, often gets closer at-
tention from a business house than
that from one which has neither.

The Myerstown Enterprise says:
Rev. Dr. John H. Umbenhen and
family expect to become residents of
this place. Rev. Dr. Umbenhen is
pastor of a flourishing Lutheran con-
gregation at Pottsville, where he has

tention of Dr. Umbenhen to discon-
tinue the ministry and live retired.
Through the will of John A. Donges,

\$75,000. In this estate are several

Umbenhen.

Rev. Umbenhen was a former pas-
tor of Trinity Lutheran church, Mt.
Joy and is also well known here.
