

AN ORDINANCE

Annexing to the Borough of Mount Joy certain territory, lots or outlots, lying adjacent thereto in Mount Joy and East Donegal Townships, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, fixing and determining the corporate boundaries of said borough, regulating the assessments in the annexed territory, and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith.

Moyer, south two and three-fourths (2 3/4) degrees West, six hundred and twenty-five (625) feet to a stone on the West side of said Marietta pike; thence crossing said pike, and through said G. Moyer's land; South, seventy-four (74) degrees, sixteen hundred and eighty (1680) feet to a stone on the East side of the Columbia road; thence through lands of Jacob Zercher, and Clayton H. Hoffman respectively, south eighty-five and one (85 1/2) degrees East, thirty-five hundred and twenty-eight feet (3528) to a stone; thence through said Hoffman's land and J. E. Longenecker's land, North, sixty (60) degrees East, six hundred and eighty (680) feet to a stone on the West side of the Little Chickies Creek, near the South-west wing wall of the Electric Railroad Bridge; thence up along the west side of said Little Chickies Creek, the several courses thereof, twenty-eight hundred and twenty-eight (2828) feet to the place of beginning.
