

On Saturday a herd of cattle on the David M. Eyer farm at Rowenna, was dispatched because they suffered from the foot and mouth disease. Amos Shank, who resides on the farm, was assisting with the work, and had a narrow escape from being crushed to death by a cow. Mr. Shank was in the bottom of a trench into which a cow had been led. Mr. Shank raised his rifle and fired. The bullet hit the animal fair. The cow sprang into the air and falling caught Mr. Shank pinning him fast against the side of the trench. He was released by men who found that he had escaped with a few bruises and lacerations.

 opened on Sunday and now the room is more spacious. Throughout the day the offices were busy mailing reports to the Washington and Harrisburg authorities. Lancaster county still has more cases of the disease than any other county.

On account of the heavy expenses caused by the epidemic the Department of Animal Husbandry at Washington has issued orders that animals, where the cost will aggregate more than \$200 in a single herd, shall not be killed, unless the owner will agree that payment for the other animals be contingent upon the further appropriation of money by Congress.

Six additional Federal men reported to Dr. Townsend and were assigned to duty at once. The disinfecting parties will soon be sent out. So far today no additional cases were reported.

Two steers, one cow and three hogs belonging to John Witmer, of Newtown, were killed by the authorities on Friday and buried in quick lime.

WAR REVENUE TAXES

Special Taxes Imposed by Recent Act on Manufacturers and Dealers in Cigars and Tobacco, Brokers, Theatres, Bowling Alleys and Billiard Tables

The Special Taxes imposed by the Act of Congress of Oct. 22, 1914, became due on the first day of November. These taxes will be paid for eight months from Nov. 1, 1914, to June 30, 1915.

Collector of Internal Revenue Kirkendall has instructed his field deputies to make a thorough canvass of their divisions and secure from each person liable to the tax a sworn return on Special Form 11. The Collector desires to call attention to the law which requires all persons liable to the special tax to make a return within the month that their liability occurred, that is, the month of November. Failing to make such return in time renders the person liable to an additional tax of fifty per cent and to a specific penalty of not more than \$500. Therefore, taxpayers, if not called upon in person, should write to their division deputy or to Fred C. Kirkendall, Collector, Lancaster, Pa., asking for a blank Form 11A. Collector Kirkendall desires that no one should have to pay the penalty for neglect, but the law is mandatory and the penalty will have to be collected if incurred.

The Special Taxes imposed are: Brokers, \$30; Pawnbrokers, \$50; Commercial Brokers, \$20; Custom House Brokers, \$10; Theatres, Museums, Concert Halls, \$25 to \$100 (according to seating capacity); other Public Exhibitions or Shows, \$10; Each Bowling Alley and Billiard Table, \$5.00; Commission Merchants, \$20; Dealers in Manufactured Tobacco whose sales exceed \$200 per year, \$4.80; Dealers in Leaf Tobacco, \$6.00 to \$24.00; Manufacturers of Tobacco, \$6 to \$24.96; Manufacturers of Cigars, \$3 to \$24.96; Manufacturers of Cigarettes, \$12 to \$24.96.
