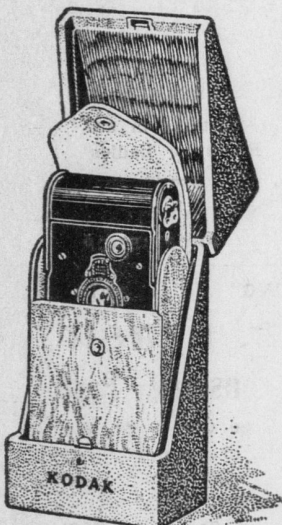

The Grain Market
(By Joseph F. Pritchard)
According to cable advices from Buenos Aires, the harvesting of wheat will be commenced in the northern part of Argentina tomorrow morning. The same cable advices say that the harvesting of this grain will be general next month, there and that a big movement is promised for early January, as well as February and the later months.

Growers of wheat in Argentina are said to be deeply in debt, and because of their financial obligations their wheat will be forced on the market earlier than usual.

Many complaints are coming from the state of Kansas, of a lack of moisture. One of the larger concerns in the Chicago trade with branches all over the Sunflower state says that whether there has been damage to the growing crop up to the present time or not the opinions are divided. From the manner in which the receipts of wheat at St. Louis and Kansas City continue to increase there is little fear of crop losses in Kansas. Those markets received 614,000 bushels jointly on Saturday, compared with 168,000 bushels for the corresponding day a year ago.

There is little doubt but what the export trade in wheat will continue on an enormous scale, in fact up to the offerings for immediate and future shipment, as well as up to the ocean freight room available.

The bears in wheat will talk more or less of the Argentine crop being in the way of that of the United States but those who are best posted on conditions say that all the wheat in the United States, as well as Argentina, will be wanted.

Lower prices would doubtless be seen in corn were it not for the good export demand that has developed and which is expected to continue.

There is a goodly open interest in the May future at Chicago and it is generally believed that foreigners are long, not only the future, but that they have considerable cash bought for delivery as soon as the grain is available. This fall has been excellent for curing and husking of corn and the movement will likely increase freely.

The export trade in oats has fallen off somewhat but this was caused partially by the fact that foreigners have big amounts of that grain going to them and they are anxious to closing up parts of these offerings before they make additional further purchase except on the soft spots.

With the opening of the stock yards tomorrow and a hog market upon which to do business in the provision pit on the Board of Trade, additional activity is expected to be seen. The cash trade in hog products has been larger than generally known and a great deal of this is being used in the way of shipments abroad.

An Old Man
Micajah Weiss, the oldest pensioner in the United States, died a short time ago at his home in Beaver Brook, Sullivan county, New York, of infirmities incident to his advanced years. He was in the 114th year of his age and probably the oldest man in New York. He was born at Dancing Creek, Monroe county, Pennsylvania and was one of a family of nine children. The early part of his life was spent along the Delaware in lumbering and farming. For fifty-five years he was a resident of Beaver Brook, where he carried on an extensive lumber business. In his rafterdays he would frequently walk back from Trenton to Beaver Brook, more than 100 miles, long before railroads were constructed. He had been known to drive a four-horse load of venison down Delaware valley to Trenton. In August, 1862, Mr. Weiss enlisted in a regiment of Pennsylvania volunteer infantry and served until the close of the war in 1865. Mr. Weiss was not a teetotaler, taking a glass of wine or other stimulant when he thought he needed it. When he returned from the fiftieth anniversary of the battle of Gettysburg in July, 1913 he stopped off in New York City and visited the late General Daniel E. Sickles.

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

Order of General Quarantine
The following order of general quarantine was adopted by the State Livestock Sanitary Board November 10, 1914, and supersedes the order of general quarantine adopted November 5, 1914, on certain counties.

The fact has been determined by the State Livestock Sanitary Board and notice is hereby given that foot and mouth disease which has been and is adjudged and proclaimed by said Board to be of a transmissible character exists in livestock throughout the State of Pennsylvania.

Therefore the State Livestock Sanitary Board under authority conferred by law does hereby establish a general quarantine throughout the State of Pennsylvania, subjecting to said quarantine all cattle, sheep, other ruminants or swine.

It is hereby ordered, first: No cattle, sheep, other ruminants or swine shall be removed from or out of the said quarantined area.

Second: No cattle, sheep, other ruminants or swine shall be moved into the said quarantined area, except on official permit and for immediate slaughter.

Third: No public sales or exhibitions of cattle, sheep, other ruminants or swine in the said quarantined area are permitted.

Fourth: It is forbidden to drive, transport or move cattle, sheep, other ruminants or swine over or upon public roads, highways or railroads in the said quarantined area, except upon specific permission in writing from an agent of the State Livestock Sanitary Board expressly authorized to issue such permits.

Permits for driving, transporting or moving cattle, sheep, other ruminants or swine over the public roads, highways, or railroads must be taken out in advance and must be held by the person in charge of and accompanying such animals, and must be kept available for inspection.

Fifth: No cattle, sheep, other ruminants or swine shall be shipped by rail in the said quarantined area except in cleaned and disinfected cars bearing Federal side cards (I. D. Form 57A) which give place and date of disinfection.

So far as possible, cars shall be cleaned and disinfected at established and specially equipped cleaning and disinfecting stations, then sent to the place where the cattle, sheep, other ruminants or swine are to be loaded. Stock cars must not be permitted to enter the said quarantined area unless bearing Federal side cards (I. D. Form 57A) showing that cars have been cleaned and disinfected since they were last used for transportation of livestock.

Sixth: The transportation of dressed carcasses of calves, sheep, other ruminants or swine within or from the said quarantined area is prohibited unless the hides or skins and hoofs are removed from the carcasses except that hogs need not be skinned and the movement of hides, skins, and hoofs of cattle (including calves), sheep, and other ruminants, and of hay, straw or similar fodder within and from the said quarantined area, is prohibited unless the said hides, skins, and hoofs and all hay, straw or similar fodder be disinfected prior to movement under the supervision of an agent of the State Livestock Sanitary Board. Provided however that hides or skins removed prior to September 1, 1914, also hay, straw or similar fodder stored or stored on non-infected premises prior to September 1, 1914, need not be disinfected.

Seventh: The general quarantine proclaimed hereby supersedes the general quarantine proclaimed November 5th, 1914, on certain counties and shall be maintained in force until officially revoked by the State Livestock Sanitary Board.

All transportation companies, cattle dealers, farmers, officers of the law and others are called upon to assist the State Livestock Sanitary Board in the enforcement of the foregoing order of quarantine so that this outbreak of disease may be eradicated with the least possible loss and in the shortest possible time.

Violations of any of the foregoing orders will be prosecuted according to the provisions of the Act of July 22d, 1913.
