Farmers Column

VERY VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR THE FARMERS

Scours in Calves—When Pigs Get Vicious Ring Them—Investigation Proves that Cow Can Be Made to Pay Better. Grounding the Fence Wires

For those insects that suck the juices, such as lice, soapuds or kerosene emulsion is the thing. Apply with a spray.

The average quality of milk should yield about 4 per cent. of butterfat by the Babcock test. Full directions for the use of this and other tests are sold with the testing machines. Five per cent. of the milk is an average yield of butter.

Grounding fence wires affords considerable protection from lightning and is a worth while investment for farmers. As hundreds of valuable animals are struck by lightning in this state every summer, many of the casualties being directly due to currents carried along pasture fences, such advice is particularly timely. To secure the best results the ground wires ought to be placed about one hundred feet apart and closely stapled to the post, so as to form a contact with every one of the fence wires. The ground wires should also extend slightly above the fence post, and like a lightning rod, should penetrate the soil far enough to reach moist earth. No. 8 or 9 wire is most satisfactory for this purpose.

From a careful investigation we find that our common cows are capable of producing a much larger yield than is secured from the average common cow in the state. During the past decade we have always had at the Minnesota university farm, in the dairy herd, a number of common cows; that is, cows with no dairy heredity. The average yield from these common cows, for nearly 23 yearly records, is 5,000 pounds of milk and 222 pounds of butter, which last, valued at 27 cents, numbers to \$60 for butter alone. The average receipt per common cow in the state is \$46.40; which shows that the average cow is yielding \$14 less per annum than she might easily yield if given the same care and feed as are given the cows at university farm.

When the sows get unruly and inclined to make trouble of various kinds they can be readily controlled by an arrangement made of ropes and placed around the jaws of the animal. Such a rope is not easy to put in position with an angry hog, so a little device made of an old broom handle is used. Insert a small hook in one end of the handle and near the other end nail a strap, which, fastened so as to form a loop, will enable one to get a firmer grip on the handle. Then take the rope and make a slip noose in one end, hang it from the hook on the end of the small pole and, with a quick movement, place the loop over and around the upper jaw, when the mouth is forced open. Take hold of the rope with one hand just above the noose and with the help of the finger insert the ring or rings on the snout. The animal will be unable to fight much with this appliance around its jaw.

One kind of scours is an infectious disease which gains access to the body of the calf soon after birth thru the freshly broken navel cord. It usually occurs within a week and often within 48 hours after the calf is born, and runs its course quickly. The symptoms are sudden, severe sickness, sunken eyes and usually a white, foul smelling dung. If one calf has become infected others are liable to contract the disease and die in the same manner. It is important to thoroughly disinfect box stalls where calves are dropped and have them well bedded with clean straw. It is always a good plan to disinfect the navel cord when the calf is born and, if there is reason to suspect they might contract the disease, extra precautions should be taken, such as singeing the cord with a hot iron, which stops up the opening, or to tie the end of the cord with a string and wrap a strip of cloth around the calf's body. A mild solution of creolin, zenoleum or carbolic acid should be applied to the cord as a disinfectant.

TOBACCO NEWS

Purchase of the 1914 Crop Has Begun—Price Nearly 12 Cents

The purchase of the 1914 Lancaster County tobacco crop has begun, with the exception of the limited amount of hail cut, the buying has very little ginger to it.

During the last week a large amount of the small acreage of hail cut was picked up by the chewing tobacco representatives at the flat price of 6 1/2c per pound. Practically all of that kind of Lancaster County tobacco will have been sold by the end of next week if the growers will accept the price.

A few crops of first grade tobacco have been picked up by local buyers. The price paid could be ascertained in only one instance, and that was 11 3/4c per pound.

The Lancaster County crop has cured A. 1. It has good color, left and there is very little pole burn to be found.

Stripping is general thruout the county, and during the damp spell in the early part of the week a large amount was taken from the poles in the sheds, and put in the cellars and the stripping forces will be kept busy until the holidays and after.

It is expected the buying of grade tobacco will begin in earnest about January 1, when it is predicted financial conditions will be greatly improved, or such that the packers can get accommodations at reasonable rates.
