David Brandt, a well known and highly respected resident of Elizabethtown, died on Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock from apoplexy. He was stricken the day before and never rallied. The deceased was seventy-two years old, and was a farmer by occupation, but retired several years ago. He was a member of the Church of the Brethren, and is survived by his wife and three sons, David, Irwin and Edward, all of Elizabethtown. The funeral took place on Sunday morning at 9:30 o'clock at the Church of the Brethren with interment in Mt. Tunnel cemetery.

One brother, Mr. Reuben Miller of Lancaster Junction and two sisters, Mrs. Philip Hottenstein of East Petersburg and Mrs. Elizabeth Eckhardt of Manheim, survive. The funeral was held from her late home in this place at 9:30 on Sunday morning and at 10:00 o'clock in the Church of God here. Interment was made in the Eberle cemetery.

Daniel Heisey

Daniel Heisey, an aged and highly respected citizen of Florin, died at his home at 6:50 Friday morning after an illness of five weeks, aged 78 years, death being due to general paralysis. Deceased was a farmer by occupation but has lived in Florin the past fourteen years where he was engaged at broom making and carpentering. He leaves four children: Eli, of Lancaster; Lizzie, wife of Mr. Levi F. Sheetz of Florin; Enos, of Bamfordville and Amanda of the Zion Home near Lititz. One brother, Levi Heisey of Mechanicsburg and two sisters, Mary wife of Benjamin Heisey of West Donegal and Lydia of Harrisburg, also survive. He was a lifelong member of the Brethren in Christ. The funeral was held at 9:30 from his late home in Florin on Sunday forenoon and at ten o'clock at the Cross Roads meeting house. Revs. Henry Hoffer of Rapho and J. N. Martin of Elizabethtown officiated. Interment was made at Cross Roads cemetery.

Jacob Z. Heisey

Jacob Z. Heisey, a life long resident of Maytown, died at his late home in that borough, on Wednesday evening at 11:30 o'clock, from dropsy aged 60 years. He had been confined to the house for the last several months, suffering from the disease, and was unable to lie in bed for the last two weeks being compelled to sit in a chair, both day and night. The deceased was born in Maytown and was in the undertaking business for a number of years. He was a member of the Maytown Reformed church, and was a very active member. For a number of years he was a deacon and elder, an assistant superintendent of the Sunday school, and one of the organizers of the Nevin Missionary Society in 1888.

He is survived by his wife and the following children: Dr. William C. Heisey, of McKeesport, Penna.; Mrs. Anna Hollenbach, who resides in Canada and Miss Mary at home. The funeral services were held from his late home Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock. The interment was made in the Maytown Union cemetery.

INSPECTING RAPHO CATTLE

No New Cases of Foot and Mouth Disease Discovered of Late

A State Inspector is now inspecting the cattle on the farms throughout Rapho township. Monday he inspected three herds southeast of town and several yesterday and thus far no new cases of apthous fever have been found.

The fine herd of live stock on the farm of Mr. Amos N. Musser, a short distance east of here, was dispatched last Friday. The method employed was somewhat different from those practiced at other places.

A ditch 49 feet long, 8 feet wide and 7 feet deep was dug. Instead of driving the cattle into this trench separately, the entire herd of 27 was driven into it, and then the shooting began and continued as rapidly as possible until all were killed.

On the Spangler farm, near Maytown, tenanted by Mr. Albert Hoerner, seventy-two head were condemned and will be put to death this week as soon as the "grave" can be dug.
