Farmers Column

VERY VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR THE FARMERS

Annual Farmers' Week at the Pennsylvania State College will be interesting and instructive to all who attend—Opens December 28.

The annual Farmers' Week at the Pennsylvania State College will be held December 28, 1914 to January 2, 1915. It is desired that every farmer who can possibly embrace the opportunity, visit his state's educational institution at that time. With the completion of the new buildings, the seating capacity available for visitors attending lectures and demonstrations will be sufficient to accommodate everybody.

In addition, to the teaching force at the college, a number of outside men have been engaged for the week. These men are such as recognized authorities in their particular lines of agricultural endeavor. The lectures, demonstrations and entertainments scheduled for the week will treat on improving soil fertility; the intelligent purchase of plant food; the use of lime; the improvement of farm crops; the growing of beef cattle; improvement of the dairy herd; the best methods of feeding and handling hogs, sheep, horses and fat cattle; on the growing of vegetables for home use and for market; the production of poultry; growing of flowers, every phase of fruit growing, upon rural community betterment. There will be a special section for women by the Home Economics Department. A special week's program will also be rendered for boys and girls. This latter program was originally designed for members of corn clubs winning free trips to the College. All others may attend these exercises however. It matters not in what phase of agriculture a man is interested nor to which member of his family the Farmers' Week might appeal, there will be something interesting and valuable for all.

The expenses of the week's trip, including carfare, board and lodging will amount to 15 or 18 dollars. Special rates will probably be granted over the Pennsylvania lines. Experiences last year showed that it was advantageous socially and economically to have all the visitors from a county room and board at the same place. A special effort will be made to establish a "Lancaster County House" at State College this year. It is desired that we have a delegation of at least thirty. Any persons desiring to attend Farmers' Week will please write or call up the Lancaster County Farm Bureau, 6 W. King St., Lancaster County, Pa., not later than December 17, 1914. By so doing you will save money and more agreeably located.

Through the combined control efforts of the State Livestock Sanitary Board and the Federal Bureau of Animal Industry, apthous cattle fever has been brought under control so far as the original infection from shipped cattle is concerned. The herd now being reported in Lancaster County are largely such as have been exposed to infection either directly or indirectly. Unfortunately, a number of these later infections are due to carelessness and to preventable causes.

When an infected premises is placed under quarantine all animals infected or exposed to infection should be confined closely. Visitors (except those properly authorized) should not be allowed. When any symptoms of the disease manifest themselves the owner should report the case at once whether the place has been inspected or not. This has proven one of the causes of additional infection in this county. No milk or butter should be sold from infected animals. All skimmed milk fed to pigs or calves should be pasteurized by heating to 180 degrees. A few cases reported during the last week have been traced directly to this source. When the trench is dug, it is unwise to go to your neighbor to borrow tools or implements unless the proper disinfecting precautions are observed. All persons aiding in the killing of infected animals should wear rubber clothing which should be disinfected with bi-chloride of mercury both before and after leaving the premises. Animals about to be killed should be properly secured before they are led out into the trench. There are instances where this was not properly attended to. All killed animals should be covered immediately with quick lime and earth. The path over which the animals were led to the trench should be covered with lime or some disinfectant. Dogs should not be allowed to run over an infected community. There is at least one case where the disease was transmitted by dogs going back and forth between an infected premises and a neighbor's barn. All stables, floors etc., will be disinfected by authorized men as soon as time will permit.

Apthous fever is the most contagious animal disease known and can be carried in a great variety of ways than any other.

so long as they do lend their hearty support in observing the quarantine regulations in the best possible manner, so long we may expect the disease to crop out from time to time.

Authentic information has it that some of the men authorized to carry out the field work of inspection are lax and careless in their routine. Such methods are not only hazardous to the men whom they visit but they also have a demoralizing effect upon the community as a whole in observing the quarantine regulations. Carelessness in carrying out the details of the work is not the wish of the men in charge so that if any irregularities on the part of the men in the field is reported to the office in Lancaster it will be duly appreciated and the trouble will be properly remedied.

During the local apthous fever outbreak of 1908, formaldehyde was used in fumigating the infected cattle barns. In a few instances the unfortunate farmer had part or all of his tobacco crop in the barn which was fumigated. When these crops were purchased later by local buyers, it developed that the fumes of the formaldehyde had ruined the crop entirely for all purposes. At the suggestion of the local Leaf Tobacco Board of Trade, the Farm Bureau took the aggressive in the beginning of the present outbreak in order to avert the development of a situation which might easily have proven disastrous to the sale of our 1914 crop. It is easily apparent that the issue was not a matter of the immediate crops directly involved but that the demoralizing price effect might even have extended to Lancaster County's future crop.

In order to devise ways and means, a conference was called with matter so important to Lancaster farmers was fully discussed. It was then fully decided that no formaldehyde would be used for fumigating infected premises. It was further assured that no chemical would be used which would in any way injure the quality of this year's excellent crop. Dr. Marshall further expressed that since tobacco was a disinfectant in itself, the present outbreak of apthous fever in Lancaster County would not affect the sale of tobacco and that the farmers and the trade may be assured that the present crop would sell at its par value.

A Lancaster Corn and Tobacco Show will be held jointly by the Tobacco Growers Association and the Farm Bureau some time during February. Committees have been appointed but the detailed arrangements have not yet been completed.
