 Immediately after the market was over Mr. C. S. Frank sold a large lot of barrel and basket apples at public sale.

#### The Building

The market house is located on the corner of New Haven and Cherry streets, near the Washington House. It is a substantial one-story brick structure, 100 feet long and 44 feet wide, and contains about eighty stalls. It is electrically lighted, and has a ten-foot wide concrete floor under roof, the full length of the building on the Henry street side, which will be used for fruit stands. The market house is owned by a stock company, of which Albert Strickler is president; H. G. Hagenberger, secretary, and Samuel G. Myers, treasurer. In addition to these officers, the following are also directors: Monroe Forney, Amos Wagner, Landis Charles and Ezra Engle.

**Automatic Professor.**  
 The automatic professor is a mechanical means of teaching language which has just been introduced and which promises to become a favorite because of the ease and convenience with which it enables one to acquire a language. The device consists of a combination of the phonograph with a piece of mechanism which operates a reel on which are printed words and sentences so that the student is enabled to see the word at the same time that he hears it. The phonograph alone has already been utilized for the teaching of language with some success, but the efficacy of the new combination is much greater and the student acquires a greater familiarity with the language, both written and spoken, in less time. It is also applicable to elementary instruction in music.

### Long Lost Ship Found.

The steamer Centennial, which left Muroran, Japan, six years ago for San Francisco with a cargo of sulphur and never was heard from, is reported fast in the ice off Saghalin island, Okotak sea, near Siberia.  
 A Russian expedition bound through the Okotak discovered the missing vessel with lifeboats gone, the name partly obliterated and her iron work corroded.

There was no sign of a human being on the ship.  
 Capt. E. Hieber, who piloted the Russian expedition that found the Centennial, told G. A. Griffin, an engineer of the Philippine coast guard, of his discovery and Griffin repeated the story here at headquarters of the Marine Engineers' Beneficial association. Hieber has been asked for further details.

### HOME HEALTH CLUB

**KIDNEY DISEASES:** It is a very common thing for people who are suffering on account of lameness or soreness in the muscles of the back, to at once conclude that they have kidney disease. Many advertisements of various patent medicines have fostered and encouraged the idea because a lame back or pain in the muscles is very common and many people can be induced to part with their money when made to believe that there is a deep and mysterious cause for their pains.  
 Now, as a matter of fact the pains which as a rule are felt in the back and loins, seldom come from or have anything to do with the kidneys or their diseases. A severe contraction of certain muscles of the back would interfere with the nerves controlling the action of the kidneys, but if the kidneys themselves were first diseased the suffering would not be noticed in the back, especially in the dreaded Bright's disease.

Pain in the back may be found as one of the symptoms in cases of congestion of the kidneys, inflammation or Nephritis, and in Addison's disease. When pain in the back comes from Bright's disease of the kidneys there will be so many other pronounced symptoms present that the average physician will pay but little attention if any, to them.

Having mentioned conditions of the kidneys in the back may be one of the symptoms, I will tell you of the other symptoms. In cases of congestion of the kidneys or as our learned profession would probably speak of it "Venous Hyperemia of the kidneys," we find first a diminishing of the flow of urine. Upon standing awhile the urine is found to contain a sediment which may be easily seen. There may be a sense of fullness, dull pain and tenderness in the region of the kidneys. Usually the symptoms of disturbances of the liver are marked, such as sallowness, constipation, loss of appetite and dizziness.  
 Now in cases of Nephritis there are prominent symptoms of pain and feverishness, high colored and back, sometimes extending to the groins and bladder, also headache and feverishness, high colored and scanty urine which is often mingled with blood or pus. When such symptoms follow back injuries they are bad and require prompt treatment of the right sort. Such symptoms are also bad when they follow Scarlet Fever. Dropsy is likely to follow.

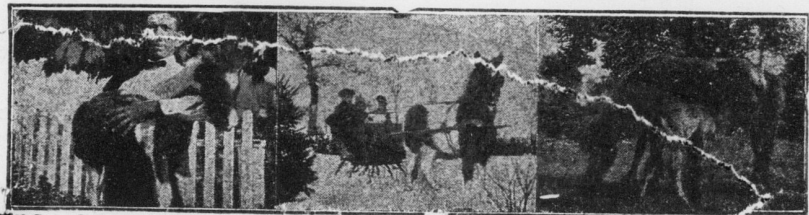

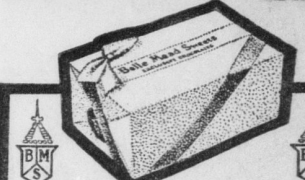
