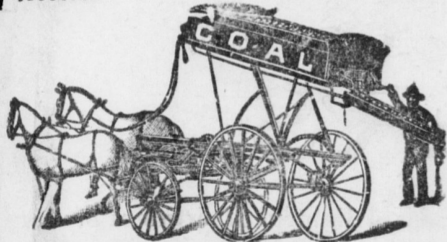

Farmers Column

VERY VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR THE FARMERS

Feeding Dry Grain to Calves—Would Dwarf All Fruit Trees—All Fruit Should be Put in Attractive Form for Market—Dairy and Live Stock

Sheep will not bear neglect and thrive. Long and hard pulling makes broken horses. The surplus horses on many farms eat up the profits. There is no animal more unprofitable than poor sheep. If a sow breeds well and is a good mother, keep her until she is old. The farmer's team should be one well adapted to his requirements. The most profitable beef, pork or mutton is that put upon the market early.

Badly constructed stable floors have injured many more horses than hard work. Keeping the wagon and buggy well oiled is one way of being kind to the horses.

Allowing the manure to accumulate in the stable may be convenient, but it is unhealthy for the animals.

An abundance of alfalfa and bran insures a sufficient amount of protein and mineral matter.

One of the greatest arguments in favor of fall freshening is that it balances the work of the farm to a nicety.

All bulls should be treated as they were ugly and vicious. Any other method of treating them is careless in the extreme.

Cream that is too ripe is not fit for butter-making. It should be churned as soon as it reaches the proper degree of acidity.

Corn cut at the dent stage of maturity has reached its maximum growth and silage made at this time has its maximum value.

Even under best of conditions the calves are inclined to bark apple trees, and should not be turned loose in young orchards.

If milk contains large numbers of blood corpuscles or pus cells, it is an indication that the cow from which it was drawn is diseased.

The way fruit is put on the markets determines whether it will sell at the highest figures. If we are to be successful in disposing of the surplus fruit we must be sure the fruit is packed in an attractive manner. The package often sells the fruit. In the first place the apples should be hand picked. In the second place clean boxes or barrels should be used.

Do not put choice apples in old boxes, sacks or barrels. Pack the apples tightly to prevent bruising. Select the type of package best suited to the demands of the market. Some markets want apples in boxes, while others prefer the barrel. Always consider the other fellow. Would you want to buy apples that were wormy, badly bruised, good and bad in the same package? No! You want apples of uniform quality, put up in an attractive form.

A novel proposition to increase the orchard yield of the country by dwarfing all fruit trees and plants was advocated by Prof. Close, a pomologist of the department of agriculture, in a lecture on "The Home Fruit Garden," delivered before the Washington Y. M. C. A. Prof. Close's lecture was one of others delivered by experts of the department, designed to help the city man reduce the cost of living by teaching him how to grow fruit, vegetables and flowers in his own back yard.

I grow 40 varieties of fruit on less than a quarter of an acre of land at my own home, said Prof. Close, and any other man can do the same. The secret is in dwarfing all trees by pruning or pinching off the top buds till they do not exceed a height of two feet above the ground. In this way the full strength of the tree or plant is given entirely to fruiting.

Before adjournment a resolution endorsing Hon. A. S. Martin's candidacy for Secretary of Agriculture was taken in hand passed unanimously by the Institute.

Large Crowds at Evening Session
The evening session was the banner one of the Institute, all seats being occupied and many were obliged to stand. The exercises consisted of lectures on education lines suitable for farmers and farmers' boys. Sheldon W. Funk's lecture was, entitled "An Appeal to Our Farmer Boys." Mr. Campbell spoke on "The Farm of Life."

In closing the Institute, County Chairman J. W. Bruckart stated that years ago he was very well acquainted with farm conditions and appearances in the Donegals and Conoy townships. Judging by what can be observed now farming has changed very much for the better and he believed it was due to a great extent to the work of the Maytown Farmers' Institute.

Will Close on Xmas
The saloon of Lancaster city and county will close on Christmas Day not later than 2 o'clock in the afternoon. This was decided on at a largely attended meeting of the Lancaster County Liquor Dealers' association held Wednesday afternoon in the Hotel Wheatland.

The members were advised not to give out any calendars or presents not only at Christmas, but at all times. The act of the Legislature on June 12, 1913, carries with it a fine or revocation of license if disobeyed. A card with words to this effect will be sent to every member of the organization.

MAYTOWN INSTITUTE

The Most Successful Series of Meetings Held For Many Years

The last of the Lancaster County Farmers' Institute was held on Wednesday and Thursday at Maytown, and the crops of State speakers and instructors have now left the community for other counties in the State.

Those who have been close observers of Institute work for many years past state that in their opinion this year's meetings were the best that were ever held. In point of attendance they may not have compared favorably with previous ones, since the apthous fever quarantine had the effect of deterring many farmers from leaving their homes except when absolutely necessary. In interest, enthusiasm and instruction, however, the Institutes are believed to have surpassed any yet held.

Thursday morning found a large gathering of Donegal and Mount Joy township farmers at the opening session of the final day of the Farmers' Institute at Maytown.

The topic, "Poultry Foods and Feeding," was taken up by Mr. J. T. Campbell. The speaker stated that the three most essential points in the success of a flock of fowls are, well-balanced feed, proper housing and ventilation, and careful breeding to insure vigor of the young stock.

Dr. M. E. Conard discussed "Raising Calves to Improve the Dairy Herd." The doctor claimed one of the great mistakes in starting a calf was overfeeding right after weaning, causing all manner of digestive and intestinal disorder. Feed little and often and introduce a grain and roughage ration as soon as the calf will take it, was his advice.

The afternoon session was opened by Sheldon W. Funk, who spoke on the "Spraying of Fruit Trees." The speaker divided the operations into two classes, winter spraying and summer spraying. The former included the lime sulphur spray for the various scale insects and leaf curl. For the codling moth in summer spraying Mr. Funk recommended a spray of bordeaux mixture made up as follows: One gallon lime sulphur, 2 1/2 pounds arsenate of lead paste and 50 gallons of water, to be applied immediately after the petals fall. For curculio and brown rot the following was recommended: One gallon lime sulphur, 3 pounds arsenate of lead and sixty gallons water, to be applied just after the calyxes fall.

For destroying rose bugs the following was recommended: Ten pounds of arsenate of lead paste, 8 quarts molasses to 50 gallons of water. Spray as soon as they appear.

"Types of Dairy Breeds," was taken up by Dr. Conard. The hall was darkened and slides were used, as pictures of world-beaters of the various breeds were shown and their make-up and conformation dwelt upon.

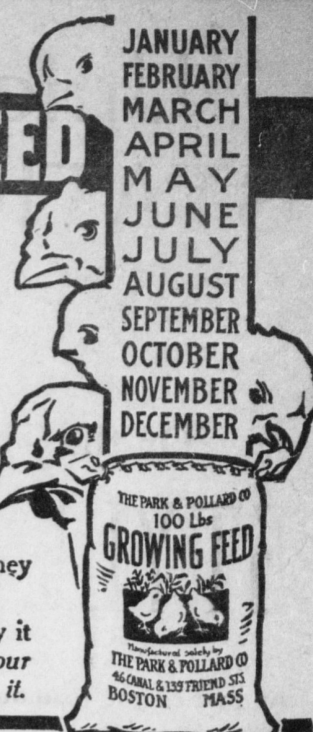
