DRAGON ALWAYS A SYMBOL

In All Comparatively Modern History It Has Figured in Some Manner.

There has always been a good deal that is mythical about the dragon, though biologists tell us the skeletons of snakes lend some credence to the notion of flying serpents. Usually in literature the dragon is associated with the author of all evil, the devil. The ancient banner of the British kings bore the device of a dragon, and the leader of the others in war was termed the pendragon. Before the conversion of the Emperor Constantine, the old Labarum or standard of the Roman army bore a bronze dragon and the bearer of the Roman standard, even after a cross replaced the dragon, was styled a "draconarius," or dragon bearer. According to the teaching of the Greek Catholic church—Greece has the same national saint as Great Britain—St. George is to be described as "trophalophoros" or standard bearer (in Greek). In old church windows and pictures St. George is commonly depicted with a standard. He would therefore bear the Latin title of dragon-man, or dragon-bearer, and the legend would easily spring into being of his encounter with a dragon. Still there is "Sir Bevis" and Spenser's "laidly worm" to be reckoned with, and it might upset heraldry to some extent if we altogether disposed of St. George's dragon in so prosaic a manner as is here suggested.

French National Museum.

The Musee Carnavalet of Paris is so seldom frequented by Americans, yet it is of vast interest. It is also known as the National museum, for it contains objects pertaining to the history of France, and especially of the French revolution. The sacredness of an antiquity clings to the building itself, which was begun in 1544, and enlarged in 1660 by Mansart, the famous architect of Louis XIV. In 1677 it became the home of Mme. de Leryigne, who lived there for 18 years, and after whom the street is named that faces the principal entrance. Among the contents of this museum are fragments and statues from noted old buildings which no longer exist. There is also a weird portrait done in wax of Henry IV, made the day after his assassination, and an autograph order from Louis XVI for the defenders of the Tuileries to cease firing! Things of historic interest are numerous, but none more sanguinary than the copy of the constitution of 1793 bound in human skin.

Adaptability of Wild Bird Life.

One of the things that encourages the sportsman to hope that the new federal migratory bird law will result in an actual increase of water fowl and other migratory game birds is the marvelous ability of wild bird life to adapt itself to changed conditions.

Ducks, for example, will quickly discover a sanctuary and flock to it with confidence, deserting other more favorable feeding grounds. Where ptarmigan are strictly protected you may walk around among them.

On the other hand, the prairie chick on would have been exterminated long ago had it not changed its habits as conditions changed. It first deserted the stubble for the corn; then it went for shelter to the windbreaks, and finally to the timber. Now this prairie bird sometimes alights in trees.

Flour Weevil.

Sometimes weevils and so-called bugs found by a housekeeper in her flour are there because of carelessness in keeping the flour bins clean. Generally, however, these pests come from the mill from which the flour or meal was purchased. To avoid criticism in this connection, millers should not only practise the greatest care in keeping the mills clean, but resort occasionally to fumigation. Hydrocyanic acid is the best agent for this purpose, since it in no way injures dry mill products of any kind, and the fact that it is extremely poisonous makes one very careful in handling it.
