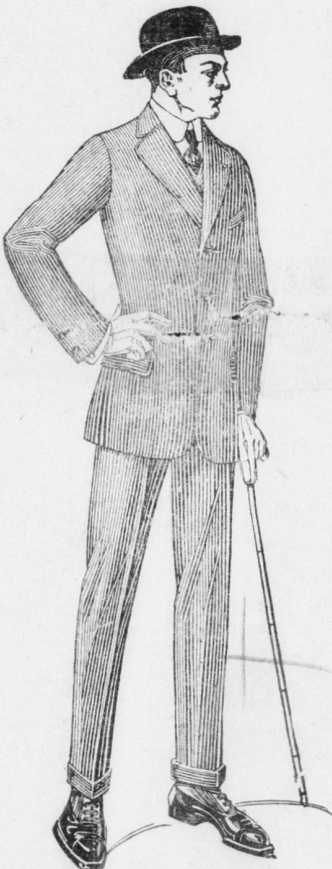

Masonic Home News

A glance at the statistics of the Homes at the beginning of the year 1915 shows a population of 190 guests; eight-five men, eighty-two women and twenty-three children; there are twenty-seven married couples among the number. This large family is a liberal patron of Uncle Sam's postal facilities, as is shown by the fact that an average of 7,000 pieces pass thru our Post Office, monthly, while during the month of December, 1914, not less than 13,048 pieces were handled.

The visitors' register records the fact that during the month of December, 1914, persons visited the Homes, bringing the number of visitors to the beginning of the year, up to 20,553.

These figures must be of interest to the members of the Fraternity throughout the State, and convey to them some idea of the activities of their Homes, a full appreciation of which is only to be obtained by a personal visit.

Another evidence of the pride the members of the Masonic Lodges of the State have in their magnificent Homes, and their deep interest in having the Homes equipped; not only with every convenience, but also

that they shall be of such a degree of excellence as is commensurate with the high standing of the Order itself, is manifested in the gift to the Homes of a magnificent polished brass lectern. It is a beautiful specimen of art. The base is supported by three large eagle feet; the upright is adjustable; the desk rests upon the back of a spread eagle and is surmounted by a reflecting electric light--all of solid polished brass. It makes an ornamental and useful adjunct to the Assembly Room, furnished for religious and other services. On a panel on the front of the stand is engraved the following:
