Master John Culp is seriously ill at this writing with an attack of pneumonia.

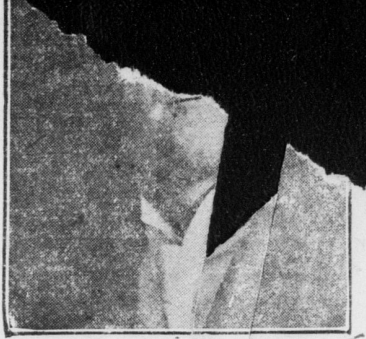
