Miss Myrtle Leedom returned from Harrisburg, having had a very pleasant time, her friend Miss Singer accompanied her home.

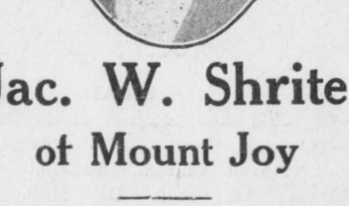
