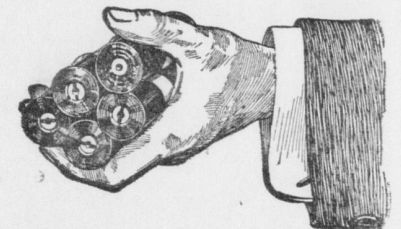

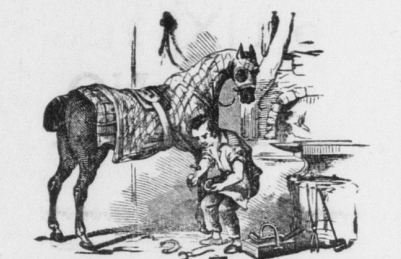

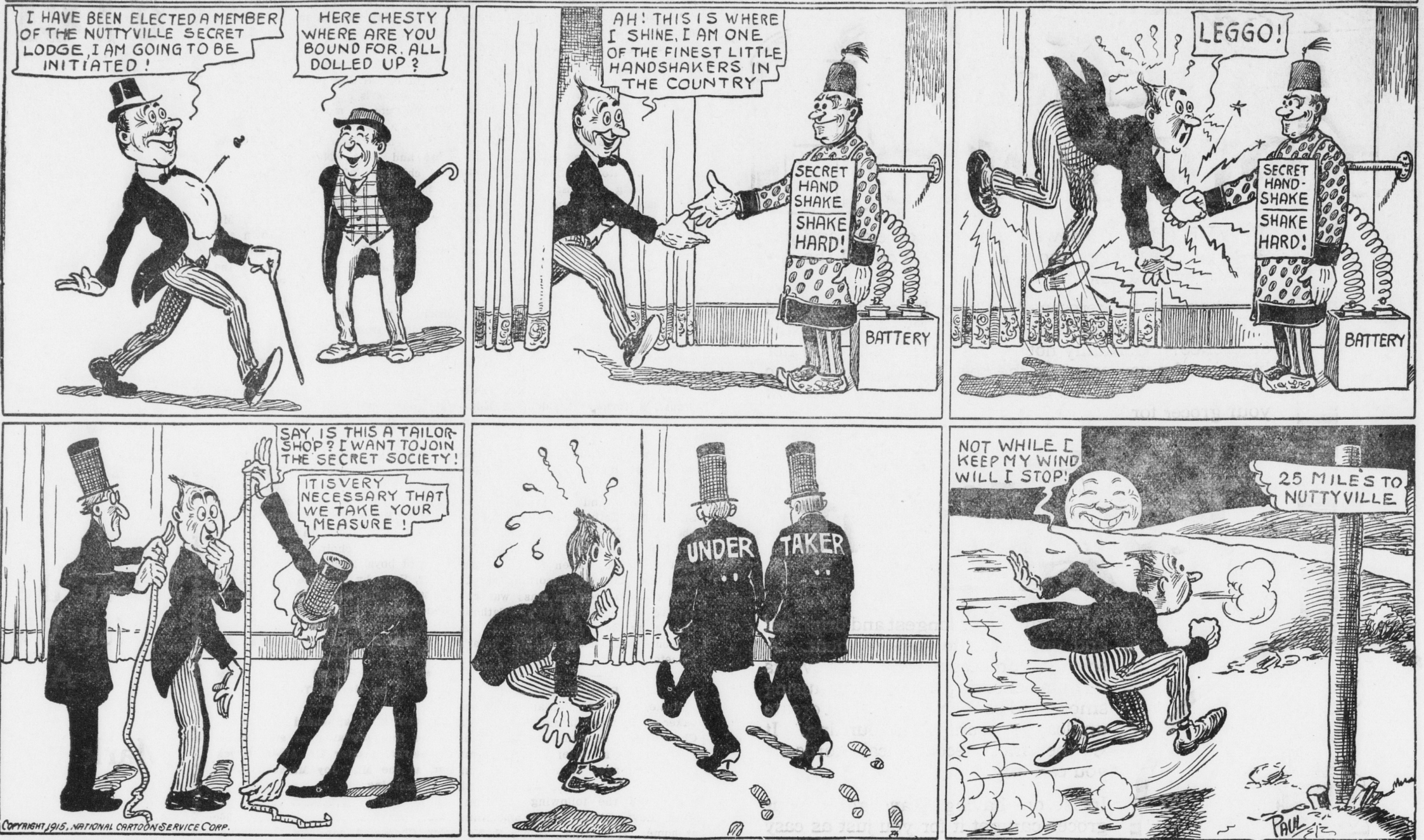

HOME HEALTH CLUB

Rest and Rebuild: In nature the season of rest is a time of gain. Strength and vigor are accumulated for renewed growth and production. Let us look at the apple or almost any fruit tree and we find that as the fall approaches the fruits bearing its seed are dropped to the ground and then covered by the falling leaves. The sap leaves the branches and goes down to reinforce the roots. The decomposition of the leaves furnish food that goes into the soil and is utilized by the roots in giving greater growth and vitality to the tree. During the winter season the tree does not get out of the free air and the cold and shut itself up where the sun and wind or the cold and snow cannot effect it. In stead it utilizes these forces to strengthen the fibers of its body and limbs so that they will be able to bear the burden of fruit during the coming season.

When the frost begins to leave the ground and the warm rains of spring or the melting ice and snow trickles down to the little roots they begin to send up material that will give greater beauty to the tree, more coloring and fragrance to its blossoms and more abundant fruit than ever before.

Man does not profit by the lessons of Nature as he should. When prevented by the elements from tilling his fields he believes, in a great majority of cases, that he has conquered nature by building a fine dwelling house well supplied with closely fitted storm windows and double doors and thoroughly heated by stoves or furnace. By his energy during the growing season his cellar is well stocked with the fruits, nuts, grains, vegetables and the pantry and storeroom well supplied with meats, jellies, jams and preserves. He laughs at the storm and the smoke from his pipe or from the frying meat, cabbage and onions, fills the rooms with a combination of odors that should give him food for reflection instead of for his stomach. He has little to do but eat and sleep and when the springtime comes, instead of being rested and refreshed, ready for bigger, broader and more abundant life with greater achievements, we find him bilious full of pains, stiffened joints, a dull brain and a year older than last spring.

Although the physical body has actually grown a year older, instead of depreciation there should be increased efficiency. During each annual resting period the mind may be actively educated and improved to such good advantage that the physical ability to produce definite results is increased in proportion and if the body is properly fed (and not overfed), exercised, washed and aired, the passing of time makes but little impression.

Constipation and biliousness, stiff joints and flabby muscles, should not be tolerated and they need not be if the practical methods of living and growth taught in these columns and the Club books are observed. Make the coming winter season the best of your life: when springtime comes be ready to help make the world about you a better place to live because you are there.

CHURCH SIX YEARS OLD

Special Services Held at Landisville on Sunday

The sixth anniversary of Zion's Lutheran church of Landisville, was celebrated Sunday with special services. The congregation was organized on October 24, 1909, by Rev. E. Cooper, of Manheim. The cornerstone was laid on May 8, 1910.

On November 9, 1910, the dedication took place by the Rev. A. E. Cooper and Dr. H. H. Weber, of the church extension board. Rev. W. Claude Waltermyer was the first pastor of the congregation. Rev. O. Leibich aided the congregation while it was negotiating a union at Bethel Union church, Millersville, and until the present pastor, Rev. J. W. Gentsler, was called and took up the work.
