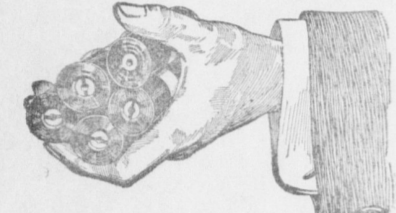

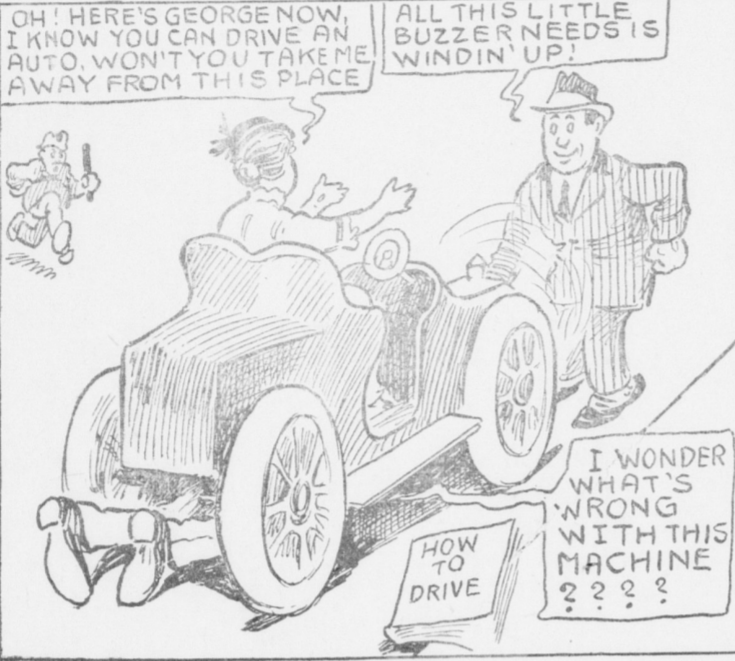
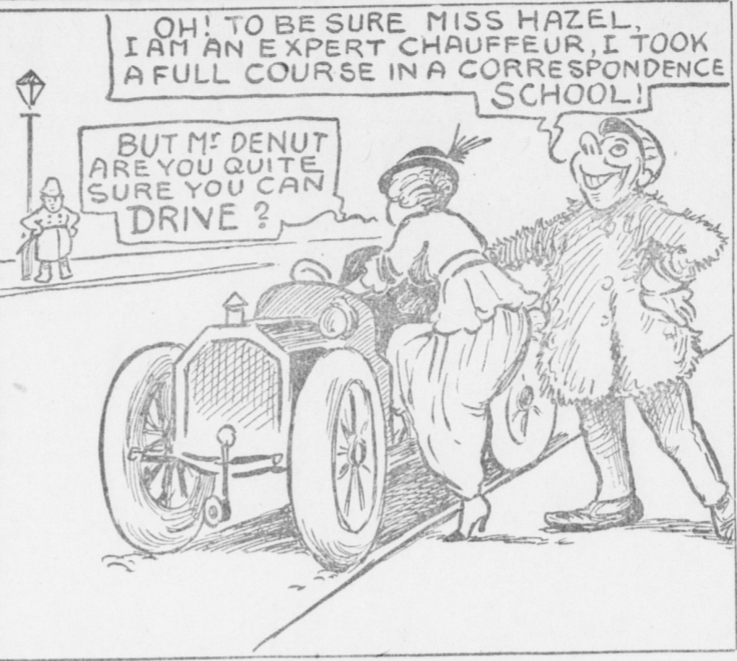

### IMPRESSIVE MEMORIAL SERVICE

Held in St. Luke's Episcopal Church on Monday Evening

On Monday, All Saints' Day, at 7:30 in the evening, a most impressive memorial service was held in St. Luke's Church, Mt. Joy, the Rev. Lewis Chester Morrison, B. A., Rector.

The occasion was the dedication of new carved oak choir stalls, the gift of Miss Elsie May Battye, organist of the Church, in memory of her mother, Mrs. Sarah Brown Battye, who died two years ago on the same day. The brass plate on the front stall of the organ side reads:

To the Glory of God in Loving Memory of Sarah Brown Battye 1861-1913

Although memorial in character, the service was a solemn festival. The recently augmented vested choir, trained by the choirmaster, Mr. Thomas J. Brown, marched into the Church in solemn dignified procession, singing "Ancient of Days."

The full choral evensong (festival) was rendered most beautifully by the choir. The Rector paid a feeling tribute in his sermon to the late Mrs. Battye.

The actual benediction of the choir stalls itself was most impressive in its churchly solemnity. This was followed by an outburst of praise by the choir in the Church's grandest anthem, the Te Deum.

As an offertory anthem, "Who Are These in Bright Array?" was sung. The Recessional hymn was "Ten Thousand Times Ten Thousand." The hymn before the sermon was "For All the Saints, Who From Their Labors Rest."

### COOKING

Little Talks on Health & Hygiene by Samuel G. Dixon, M. D. LL.D.  
Since our primitive ancestors squatted around the cooking pots after hunts for food stuffs, an incalculable amount of effort has been expended in the practice of the art of preparing food. Considering the energy spent in experimentation the accumulative knowledge has not been extensive.

Every member of the human race from early childhood to the grave now depends principally upon cooked food to maintain life.

It is not without reason that cookery is called an art. There is nothing which does more to build up and maintain good health than the proper preparation of food. It may be considered the first essential. It is commonly considered a menial task, yet next to motherhood it is one of the most important.

Thanks to modern methods of transportation and commercial enterprise there has never been a time in the history of mankind when so vast a selection of food stuffs was at the disposal of all people. This should prove a large asset to the race, for a variety of foods well prepared serves to give a well balanced nourishment conducive to proper growth and sustenance of body and brain.

Improperly cooked foods lead quicker to distress of body and mind than almost any other factor. Poverty, uncleanliness and dissatisfaction can in many instances be traced to poor cooking.

Among the least expensive foods, we may find, if well prepared, those which form a nourishing and tasteful diet. With the necessity for economy becoming more pressing as the population of the world increases, there is no one line of effort better worthy of study and attention than the science of economical and wholesome cookery—for man is indeed what he eats.

### P. R. R. AGENT AT ROWENNA RETIRED

Daniel Albright was also Freight Agent at Schock's Mills. Daniel Albright, P. R. R. agent at Rowenna, was retired today from active service. ### WOMAN FATALLY INJURED

Husband Escaped With Dislocated Shoulder and Cut Head

As the result of internal injuries sustained in an automobile accident at Akron Thursday morning at 8:30, Mrs. J. K. Stauffer of Landisville, died at seven o'clock that evening at the home of John Royer, near the scene of the accident. Mr. Stauffer sustained a dislocated shoulder and a bad cut on his head above the left eye.

Mr. and Mrs. Stauffer left their home in Landisville early Thursday morning in an automobile bound for Reading. Mr. Stauffer was driving the machine. Everything went well until a steep hill on the outskirts of Akron was reached. The road is very narrow at this point.

In attempting to pass the butcher wagon of Jacob Showalter, Stauffer ran his car into a fence. The car crashed thru the wire entanglement and plunged down a steep sixty-foot embankment.

Both Stauffer and his wife kept in the car and the former tried desperately to keep the machine righted. At the bottom of the embankment the car turned completely turtle and buried Mrs. Stauffer beneath it. The husband fell clear of the wreck and did not lose consciousness.

Mrs. Stauffer, in an unconscious condition, was carried into the home of John Royer and a physician and trained nurse immediately summoned. An examination showed that Mrs. Stauffer was internally injured while her husband escaped with a dislocation of the left shoulder and several cuts about the face and body.
