Wm. Hill, Aged Civil War Veteran Died at Marietta

Some Well Known People From Our
Neighborhood, Have Passed to the
Great Beyond Since Our Last Issue
Come to Their Reward

died at Hong Kong, China, on Oct.
13th. She was born and raised at
Washingtonboro.

John Miller
John Miller, a native of Columbia,
was shot and killed by a negro he
was arresting at Baltimore, on Fri-
day. He was a member of the Bal-
timore police force and left Colum-
bia a year ago.

Mrs. Annie R. Brubaker
Mrs. Annie R. Brubaker died at
the home of her son-in-law on the
Manheim turnpike, near Lancaster,
last Tuesday evening. The funeral
was held Saturday. Mrs. Frank H.
Musser of near this place, is a
daughter of the deceased.

George Gall
George Gall, a native of Quarry-
ville, died at his home in Harris-
burg on Friday, aged 68 years. For
many years Mr. Gall had been in
charge of the farms and real es-
tate of ex-Senator Donald Cameron,
at Donegal.

Reuben Hershey died on Friday
evening at his home near Silver
Springs, from a complication of dis-
eases. He was 74 years of age,
and has always lived in the sec-
tion where he died. His wife sur-
vives. The funeral took place on

survived by two brothers, Charles
and Paul and one sister, Augustus,
all at home. The funeral services
were held from the late home on
Monday afternoon at two o'clock and
interment took place in the Marietta
cemetery.

home on Front street yesterday,
death resulting from the effects of a
stroke and infirmities incident to ad-
vanced years. The deceased was a
veteran of the Civil War, and was a
member of the Lieutenant William
H. Child Post, No. 226, G. A. R. He
was employed during the closing
years of his life as a clock repairer,
and showed special talent along this
line. He was a member of the
Lutheran church and is the last
member of his family, his wife and
children having died a number of
years ago. Arrangements for the
