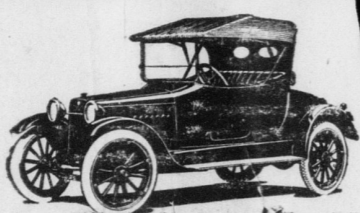

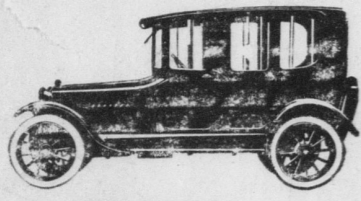

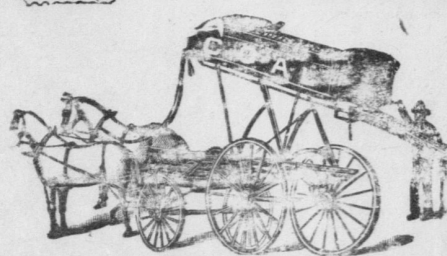

He will conduct the evangelistic services in the evening. Kathryn Ziegler, an alumnus of the school, and a missionary to India, will give talks along the line of Missionary Work.

An Educational Program will be rendered on Saturday, January 15, at two o'clock. Mr. S. G. Meyer, of the Class of 1910, will give an oration entitled "The Greatest School." #### FARM PRODUCTS SHOW

Great Preparations Being Made for the Fourth Annual Event

Arrangements are rapidly being completed for the holding of the Fourth Annual Farm Products Show to be held in the Hiemenz Auditorium, Lancaster on January 19, 20, 21, 1916. This Show will include exhibits of farm products, attractive displays by a number of business firms, as well as appropriate program and entertainment features.

The exhibits will include corn (10 and 30 ear lots); plate (5 specimens) and box exhibits of apples; 1-2 peck lots of potatoes; pound prints or rolls of farm butter; carrots, celery, leeks, parsnips, mangels and other root crops; canned goods (fruits or vegetables) and designs made of fruit or corn.

A generous premium list is offered which should attract farmers to bring in their products. It is very much desired to make this year's show exceed all previous efforts along this line.

All exhibits should be brought in or sent to F. S. Bucher, Lancaster not later than 10 A. M. January 19, 1916. Any further information will gladly be furnished by the Lancaster County Fair Bureau either by phone or letter.
