

**SLEIGHING BACK TO HEALTH**



It doesn't look as if this merry crowd of youngsters should have any difficulty in singing "Jingle Bells; Jingle All the Day," with spirit, does it? You would hardly think, to look at their cheerful, chubby cheeks, that they are always-cold patients.

They are the children from the open-air school of the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Cresson, Pa., off for a sleigh ride on the summit of the Allegheny Mountains. Fresh air and snow have no more terror for them than for a polar bear. Bundled up snugly, they can defy Jack Frost and enjoy it.

For two hours or more every day they work in the schoolroom, which is practically out of doors, and most of the other hours of the twenty-four they spend in resting, sleeping or playing in the fresh air and sunshine. This is the treatment prescribed for them by Dr. Samuel G. Dixon, Commissioner of Health.

There are more than sixty children among the four hundred patients at the institution, and these little wards of the State respond splendidly in the majority of cases to the treatment.

Rest, good food and life in the open air soon bring back the color to their cheeks and health to their bodies.

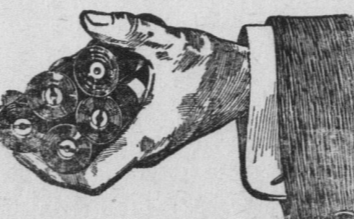

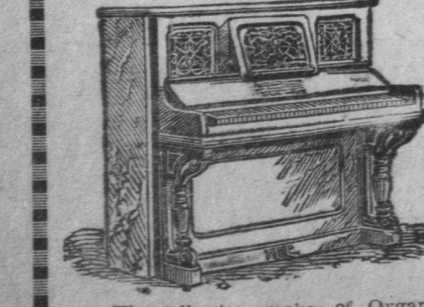
