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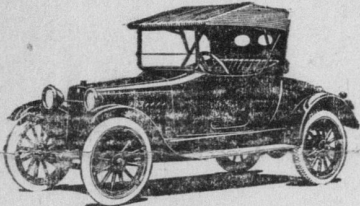
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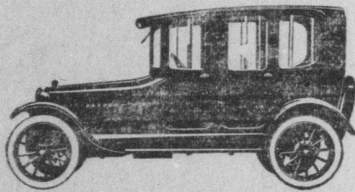
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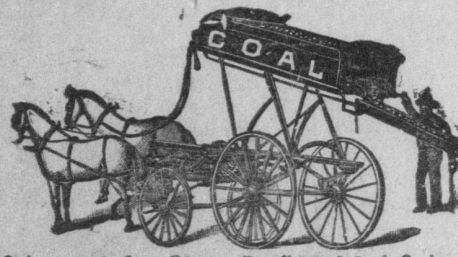

Mr. A. S. Flowers, of Marietta street, President Dillinger ruled that under a new and recent law an affidavit of one of the abutting property owners on the proposed street must accompany the petition and inasmuch as this has not been complied with, Council could not accept petition. A large number of the petitioners being present they immediately took the petition and went before a local justice, returning later and again presented it in the proper form. President Dillinger then gave all present an opportunity to speak on the subject. Messrs. Z. W. Keller, Thos. J. Brown, O. G. Lonkeneker, C. A. Wiley and J. G. Reist spoke on the matter, giving many reasons why said proposed street should be opened. The chair then referred the petition to the Street committee with orders to view the situation, meeting any or as many of the petitioners as desired, and report as soon as they conveniently can.

Bids for supplying stone to the borough for the next Councilmanic year were then opened and read. Mr. Ezra H. Engle bid as follows: Screenings, per 2,000 lbs., \$1.10; No. 1, 95 cents; No. 2, 85 cents; No. 3, 72 cents. His average for stone was 90 1/2 cents per ton of 2,000 lbs. J. N. Stauffer and Bro. bid: Screening, 98 cents; No. 1, 95 cents; No. 2, 88 cents; No. 3, 75 cents; No. 4, large or broken, 65 cents. There average bid was 89 cents per ton of 2,000 lbs. This was the closest competition bidding ever done for this work. Messrs. J. N. Stauffer & Bro. being the lowest, were awarded the contract.

The report of Burgess Geo. H. Brown showed collections to the amount of \$20.25 the past month. Mr. Gable of the Street committee, reported crossings thruout the town cleaned a number of times during the past month and repaired the foot bridge on Donegal street. He then made these recommendations: Macadamize Columbia Avenue from Market street to the Columbia road; macadamize Marietta street from New Haven west to the Eberle cemetery; macadamize Manheim street from the Farmers' Inn east to a point near the covered bridge; All these recommendations were ordered.

Mr. Gable also suggested hauling ashes on both ends of Detwiler avenue as far as the alleys. Ordered. Mr. Ricksecker of the Water committee, reported machinery at the pumping station in good shape and that work on the water wheel is progressing very nicely. Ordered a carload of coal for the pumping station but same were not yet received.

Mr. Sumpman, of the Finance committee, reported the approval of a number of bills, all of which were afterward paid.

Mr. Stauffer of the Ordinance committee, presented the ordinance as prepared by the solicitors, for the vacation of Chestnut street and the opening of a proposed new street 165 feet east of said street. The ordinance was read. The chair suggested that Burgess Brown name the new street but putting it in Mr. Brown's words, "six heads are better than one," a motion to call it Hickory street was made and carried. The ordinances were returned to the committee, signed, and again presented to Council. They then passed first reading. President Dillinger ordered them advertised in the town papers for three weeks, which is required by law, prior to their passage. They may be found elsewhere in this issue.

Mr. Sumpman, of the Property committee, reported having purchased coal for the Council Chamber, lock boxes at the post office repaired.

Mr. Ricksecker, of the Light committee, reported a number of lights out. Mr. Dillinger said he will report same to Mr. Preston, who now has them in charge.

J. E. Schroll, Chief of the Fire Department, reported everything in regards to the equipment in good shape, that the Company just purchased \$22 worth of lanterns for use at fires at night, no fires during the past month.

Mr. Z. W. Keller said that Council should compel the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to put its pavement in better shape on the north side of Marietta street, opposite the residence of Mrs. Sybilla Zeller. He said that the pavement slopes toward the gutter too much and when it is icy, walking thereon is real dangerous. Without ice, however, pavement is all right. No action.

The report of the Union National Bank, treasurer, was as follows: Balance in the Boro account, \$491.35; Water, \$826.88; Interest, \$92.00. The auditors report of the Water account was received by the Clerk. Same was accepted and ordered advertised in the Mount Joy Bulletin and the posters printed by the Herald.

Orders were then drawn to the amount of \$2,000 in favor of the Burgess, who was ordered to place \$1,000 in the Sinking fund and a similar amount in the interest account, after which Council adjourned.
