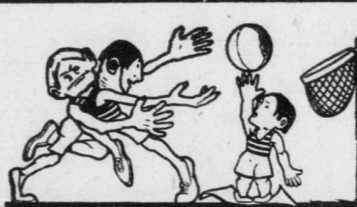

State Agricultural Notes Reports from crop correspondents of the Department of Agriculture show that the condition of the wheat in the States of Washington, Westmoreland and Somerset counties report wheat above normal condition and Fayette county wheat is above the average. The Greene and Bedford county wheat is only slightly below average.

How many bushels of corn must you raise on your land in order to pay six per cent on the money you have invested? Experts have answered this question as follows: A yield of 35 bushels to an acre on \$50 land; 42 bushels per acre on \$60 ground; 45 bushels per acre on \$70 ground; 60 bushels per acre on \$80 ground and 75 bushels per acre on a land valued at \$100 per acre. The counties in which commercial fertilizers are used most extensively in Pennsylvania are: Carbon, Chester, Columbia, Delaware, Franklin, Lehigh, Northampton, Philadelphia and York.

Statistics of the Department of agriculture show that there are fifty per cent less farmers in the State attending steers for spring market than a year ago. Only five per cent of the farmers of the State are feeding for the spring market. Westmoreland county ranks first in number of pure bred stallions in the State and Toga and Washington counties have the largest number of pure bred bulls. Statistics of the Department of agriculture show seventy-eight per cent of the farmers of the State using commercial fertilizers. This is a ten per cent decrease over a year ago and is probably due to the increased cost of fertilizers, lack of cash, home mixing and an increased use of lime.
