## How the Name Was Given

The common name, "Hessian Fly." was long ago bestowed upon this insect by Americans, because of its having committed some depredations on Long laland. New York, in 1779, in the vieinity of Lord Howe's old encampment of three years before. The Hessian mercenaries who constituted a part of this army were much despised, both at home and in America, and, on the supposition that these soldiers had brought the pest with them from their native country in the straw used for their bedding while en route, it was given the obnoxious name of "Hessian Fly."-Farmers' Bulletin, No. 640, U. 
