## MEN IN DISTRICT NO. 1 ARE READY

### SEVENTY-FOUR HAVE MADE NO EXEMPTION CLAIMS—CERTIFICATION WAS MADE TO THE DISTRICT APPEAL BOARD

## PROMINENT FARMER FELL OFF AN APPLE TREE

Benjamin F. Shank, aged forty-two, a tenant farmer on the farm of David Landis, a short distance southeast of Elizabethtown, was seriously injured yesterday in falling from an apple tree. He fell from a limb about twenty feet from the ground, and landed in such a manner that the bag of apples which he was picking fell upon his head. He was discovered by his wife, who summoned Dr. W. B. Thome. Mr. Shank's neck and right arm are completely paralyzed as a result of the accident. He is in a precarious condition and little hope is entertained for his recovery. Besides the wife, he has three children dependent upon him.

## REGULAR MEETING OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The School Board held its regular monthly meeting on Monday evening. The report of the superintendent for the term of Mr. H. O. O'Neill's leave of absence but the Board was unable to do this and Miss Grace Kinard of Leola was elected for the entire term. The board said vacancy in the Junior High. An appropriation was made for the purchase of magazines for the school. School census enumerators Frank E. Hershey reported on 380 children in town between the ages of 6 and 12 years. This is just one in advance of last year. Various needed supplies were purchased, the usual bills paid and the Board adjourned.

## CHARGED WITH FALSE PRETENSE

H. C. Bair, of Bainbridge, has been prosecuted before Alderman Stauffer on a charge of false pretense by John Leventis. It is alleged that by false representations as to his reputed wealth he received cattle to the value of \$758. It is claimed that the said representations were false and fraudulent, and were made with an intent to cheat. Bair, so it is claimed, said he had property worth \$4,000 in Perry county, his former home. Constable Price arrested Bair on Monday and bail was entered for a hearing.

### Making Big Money

According to the figures of the men in charge of the big river bridge over the Columbia river, it is expected that that structure from 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon to the same hour Monday afternoon than in any other 24 hours in its history. In that time 1,100 people walked over the bridge and 824 automobiles passed over. This does not take into account the carriages and other vehicles. The receipts for this period reached to \$225 in toll for only autos and pedestrians. This is one of the longest bridges in the state and some believe the longest.

## LOAN ORDINANCE GIVEN THE O. K.

### SUPERVISOR HENRY SMELTZER RESIGNED—NEW AND NEEDED CROSSING ORDERED LAID ON MARIETTA ST. AT TROLLEY WAITING ROOM

A special meeting of Mount Joy Borough Council was held last evening for the purpose of transacting the regular business of the September meeting with all the members present.

### Burgess' Report

The report of Burgess Brown showed collections amounting to \$65.50 this month.

### Street Committee

Mr. Gable reported gutters cleaned, weeds mowed and that Mr. H. S. Newcomer asked to have South Barbara street raised in the middle so as to turn the water to both ends of the street.

Mr. Stauffer reported that an informal meeting of Council was held about a week ago and it was decided to continue the work of repairing Main street as far west as Fairview street. Upon motion this action was ratified. The borough's share of the cost of the work as far west as the post office including oil put on this far was less than \$1,300.

Mr. Dillinger said he was requested by the Burgess to ask for a crossing on Marietta street on the west side of Delta and that there is every need of a crossing at this point for the benefit of trolley patrons. Same was ordered laid.

### Water Committee

Mr. Ricksecker reported everything in good shape and all the fire plugs flushed. Mr. Dillinger reported on a plant such as was suggested for Mount Joy by the engineers. The invitation was accepted Saturday.

### Finance Committee

Mr. Keener of the Finance committee reported the approval of a number of bills, all of which were later paid.

The ordinances for the opening of South Marlet street and increasing the borough's indebtedness for water improvement purposes and filtration plant both passed second reading.

### Property Committee

Mr. Stumpman reported everything in good shape and that roof will be put on stable at Water Works as soon as carpenters can do it. The president instructed this committee to get prices on additional lock boxes for the street department report at the next regular meeting.

### Light Committee

Mr. Ricksecker reported a few lights out but were repaired.

### Supervisor Replaced

Mr. D. F. Gable of the Street committee, reported that Supervisor Henry Smeltzer had resigned on Monday. As there were no applicants for the position, the general supervision of the Street department was left in the hands of the Street committee for the ensuing month.

### Board of Health

Secretary M. M. Leib, of the Board of Health, reported no communicable diseases and that the work of a public survey of the general conditions is now in progress.

### Treasurer's Report

The report of the Union National Bank, treasurer, showed balances in these accounts as follows: Borough, \$3,797.91; Water, \$1,620.47; Interest, \$674.00.

### Ordinance Passed

The rules were then suspended by a unanimous vote of Council, in order to take final action on the passage of the ordinance increasing the borough's indebtedness \$20,000.00, said amount being required for filtration purposes. The ordinance was then passed and upon motion ordered advertised in the Mount Joy Bulletin and the other local papers and that the former print forty copies thereof in poster form.

There was some discussion relative to the auditor's account and the limit throughout the borough and the President asked Mr. Stauffer to bring the matter to the attention of the Lancaster County Automobile Club.

The bills were then paid and council adjourned.

## PUBLIC SCHOOLS OPENED MONDAY

### ENROLLMENT THIS YEAR IS ABOUT THE SAME AS IT WAS LAST YEAR—82 IN THE HIGH SCHOOL

That summer's vacation, a rather short one this year, has ended and the children are back at school again. Our public schools opened Monday, and the enrollment this year is about the same as it was the preceding term.

There are 82 pupils enrolled in the High School, 19 less than the last term. Thirty-five of this number are from the Rural districts. A. P. Mylin is principal; Miss Elda Paul, of Park Place, and Miss Lefevre of Carlisle are the teachers in the High School.

The Junior High School has an enrollment of 75, a few more than the last term. Miss Edna Martin of Holtwood and Miss Grace Kinard of Leola are in charge.

In the Sixth Grade there are 55 pupils, a few more than the previous term, with Miss Elizabeth Eshleman in charge.

The Fifth Grade has but 39 scholars, less than the last term. Miss Laura Ulrich of Harrisburg is in charge.

There are also 39 pupils in the Fourth Grade, a few more than the previous term. Miss Buelah Weillert is in charge.

Miss Emma K. Brenner of Millersville, is conducting 33 pupils in the Third Grade. The attendance in this room is a slight advance over the past term.

The Second Grade has 48 pupils enrolled, about a dozen more than heretofore. Miss Ruth Stoll of this place, is the teacher.

About the same number as last term, 42 are enrolled in the First Grade, in charge of Mrs. Mary Garber Miller of this place.

Monday there was a total enrollment of 413. Yesterday it was 420, which makes it about the same as the last term.
