Shelly; Elmer E., and Lily A., who died in infancy of Mr. Brown came to America in 1855, and first located at Trenton, N. J., but in about two years he removed to Philadelphia, where better opportunities were offered to him as a worker. From boyhood until his retirement from business, he was always connected with the same line of manufacturing. In 1883, he laid the foundation of successful cotton and woolen manufacturing in this place. He commenced with comparatively little capital, and at a time when he had to meet the competition of similar concerns in all sections of the country that were entrenched with large financial resources and many years of prosperity.

(Continued from page 1) Information has been received at Maytown of the death at Cambridge, Kansas, of Professor Hiram T. Albert at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Maggie Doherty, Prof. Albert was born at Cambridge, in 1839 and taught school at Falmouth and Bainbridge for a number of years, afterwards removing to Millin, being in charge of the high school at that place for several years. Returning to Lancaster county he became a student at the Millersville State Normal School, after which he taught at Snow Shoe, Pa., and at several places in this county, having charge of the grammar grade at Maytown from 1860 to 1877, excepting one term that was spent at Middletown, Pa. Removing to Kansas in 1877, he engaged in farming, for a number of years, but he determined to return to his original profession and taught in Kansas schools until he became probate judge, which office he held until his death, which occurred at Maytown, in 1885, in 1859, who died in 1885.
