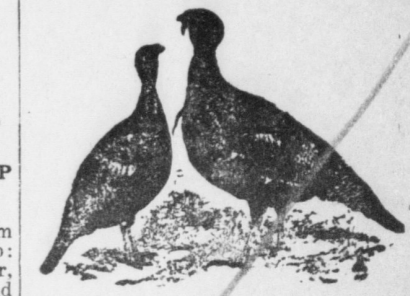

**FORMER LOCAL RESIDENTS, NOW IN THE SERVICE OF UNCLE SAM, WRITE TO THEIR FRIENDS AT HOME**  
Feeling certain that letters from our soldier and sailor "boys" to their parents, brothers, sisters or sweethearts, (especially the latter) are far more interesting than the average newspaper articles relative to camp and war life, we will publish any or all letters or any portion thereof that our friends may let us have. Kind reader if you have received a letter from a soldier or sailor, let us have it. We are desirous of keeping our people posted. Herewith is appended a list of contributors for this week:

**Letter from England**  
In a letter received from England on Saturday, under date of Nov. 19th, Walter Keller says their turkeys came across in the supply ship landed O. K. and cost them 32 1/2 cents a pound and they were exceptionally fine turkeys at that. Mr. Keller also states that it takes more than German "subs" to keep the flotilla from enjoying their holiday dinner.  
**From Fort Riley, Kan.**  
Troop H, 31st Cavalry, Fort Riley, Kansas, Dec. 1st, 1917  
For the last few weeks we have been reading the letters in the Bulletin from the Boys in the Service and must say they are real reading matter, so just to help and possibly inform some one interested, I will write a few words for publication if you please.  
My regiment (13th U. S. Cavalry) is now ordered to the Mexican border again, we left there in May of this year to come to Fort Riley, Kansas, the object being to divide the regiment into three groups, each one to fill up the ranks with regular Army recruits and form new regiments, now that work is completed we are off to the "Land of Centipedes and Cactus," for no fault of our own.  
Troops E, F, G, H, comprising the second squadron are held back for duty at the Kansas Oil fields whenever that is, this squadron always falls for such duty, only in March of this year it was the squadron that saved Columbus, New Mexico, from the Bandit Villa and his band of outlaws. Since then we have been in Mexico, Texas and on duty at the National Army cantonments all over the U. S. We have transferred "Non-Commissioned Officers to the National Army, who would rather lose an arm than leave the "Old Outfit" if we are transferring men daily to form new divisions, these hate to leave but a Good Soldier never complains.  
Our squadron leaves for the oil fields in a few days, after our stay there we move to join our Headquarters at Fort Ringgold, Texas on the Banks of the "Silvery Rio Grande" where no white man ever dared to live, (save the soldier) where Mexicans pay no attention to any Laws either of Mexico or the U. S.  
Wishing all the "Boys from Home" and a home folks a lot of luck and hoping to fight side by side with them in the present struggle I close.

Mr. Harry Gochbauer of the Central House, has gone to Pine Grove with the Elizabethtown Gun Club, of which he is a member, the party being after big game.

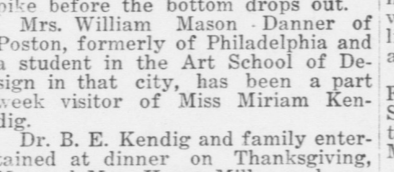
