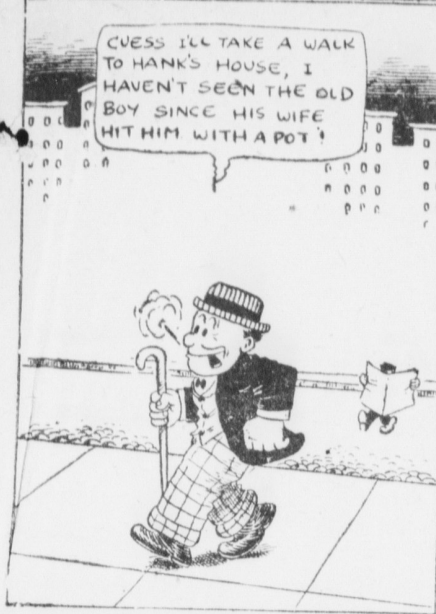
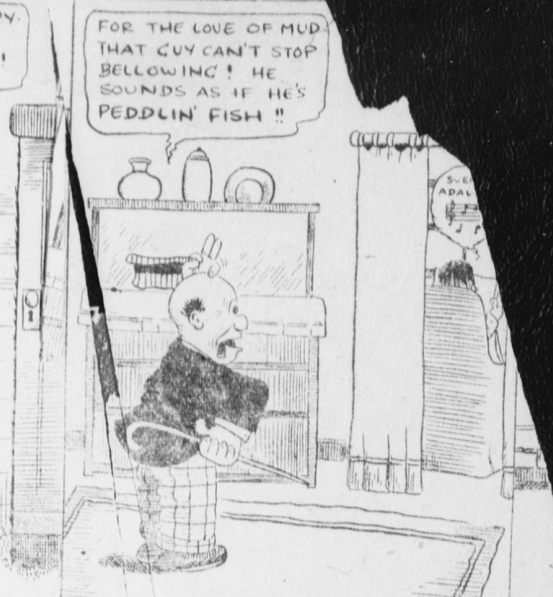

Historic School in Rapho Twp.

sible that a few people still survive, who can trace the beginning of their school life to this place. But the public school system being adopted, the little school house was abandoned as a place of learning and other buildings began to dot the hills in that section and serve as schoolhouses. Now these more modern buildings may be seen in all directions from his spot and few are in the neighborhood who can recall even the later events that transpired in the little log building. Children trip along in the road that leads to the more pretentious buildings where they are being tutored in branches of education probably never even named in the old house. Hard by is the present Hossler's school and it is a model of architectural beauty. Large, roomy, well-lighted and ventilated, this building is regarded as one of the most improved in the township. Contrasted with the structure, that once served as the place of instruction for the neighborhood, it indicates the marvelous change that has taken place with in a century.

Hossler's school is now one of the most important in the township and being in a thickly settled section, the attendance is larger than at most other points. There are numerous well-kept farm houses in the district and a number of homes along the Mount Joy road. The teacher is Miss Ada Hook, of Columbia, a graduate of the Columbia High school, who is now teaching her second term. She has won favor with the patrons in the district and is held in high esteem as a qualified and untiring teacher. Among her pupils are some boys and girls whose ancestors, in years gone by, received their early instruction in the old log school house, which the present spacious and modernized building has replaced after many years. That old school is still one of the best known landmarks of Rapho township.

Fire Destroyed Hotel
Fire of unknown origin occurred about 10 o'clock Tuesday night at Collins' Station, an intermediate hamlet between Middletown and Bainbridge. It resulted in the total destruction of Hotel Collins, owned by Chester Armstrong, of Lancaster, who will be burdened with the entire loss without practically any insurance covering the value of the building. The hotel was a well known stopping place for tourists and autoists.
