**WONDERFUL BOOM  
FOR THIS SECTION**

THE GOVERNMENT PURCHASES  
MANY ACRES OF LAND AND  
WILL ERRECT 65 BUILD-  
INGS NEAR MIDDLE-  
TOWN

A contract was executed between  
the United States government and  
the Keystone Industrial Corporation  
for the lease of 400 acres of land  
near Middletown, and contiguous to  
the aviation depot recently con-  
structed at that place. The consid-  
eration was not promulgated by either  
of the parties concerned.

Several cities throughout the  
country had solicited the selection of a  
government site for their respective  
vicinities, but preference was shown  
Middletown, because of its proximity  
to several important railroads. In  
fact, it is the center of two of the  
most important railroads in the country.  
The Pennsylvania Railroad is  
now completing arrangements for  
the construction of new yards and  
sidings near the proposed plant.

The project thus inaugurated by  
the government will constitute the  
erection of sixty-five steel and  
concrete buildings, each six stories high  
and 350 feet in length. Two ma-  
chine shops will also be constructed  
to serve an auxiliary purpose, and  
their dimensions will be 200x250  
feet. The total cost attendant upon  
the erection of these buildings will  
be approximately \$15,000,000. For  
constructive purposes, probably 10,  
000 men will be employed at these  
together with an operative force of  
5,000 additional men, will necessitate  
the construction of a special town for  
the living accommodation of these  
men. The proposed town will be  
pure in size with Steelton when com-  
pleted.

**Farmers Column**

Items in These Columns Are Pre-  
pared in the Department of Agri-  
culture, at Washington, D. C., and  
are Reliable and Trustworthy

In the United States rats and mice  
destroy each year in homes, factories,  
stores and warehouses, in cars and on  
ships, crops, poultry and other prop-  
erty, valued at more than \$200,000,  
000—an amount equivalent to the  
gross earnings of an army of 200,  
000 men. Grain, eaten and wasted  
by rats and mice on many farms,  
States, communities, and individuals  
should help eliminate rats and mice:  
By requiring that all new buildings,  
wharves and other structures be rat-  
proof; that existing buildings be rat-  
proof construction be further pro-  
tected by having basement windows  
and drains covered with screens,  
gratings, etc., and that existing build-  
ings that are not rat-proof be made  
so by remodeling. By constructing  
sewers and drains so that they will  
not provide entrance and retreat for  
rats. By insisting on greater cleanli-  
ness about markets and stores and  
generally throughout cities, villages,  
and the country districts. By thresh-  
ing and marketing grain early so that  
it is not left in the field for rats and  
mice to harbor. By burning rat and  
mice traps, trash and lumber which  
harbor rats in fields and vacant  
lots. By protecting the hawks, owls  
and other natural enemies of rats  
which are not so destructive as  
rats themselves. By keeping well  
trained rat dogs on farms and  
about city warehouses. By keeping  
precisions which rats and mice will  
attack in rat-proof containers.  
By destroying rats and mice  
systematically by poisoning,  
trapping and by organized systematic  
hunts.

**Why Not Skim Milk Routes?**  
To make use of a valuable food  
which has been very much neglected,  
the Federal Dairy Division is urging  
dealers to consider seriously the ad-  
vantage of putting out skim milk on  
their regular milk routes. Con-  
sumers can help the movement by  
asking for the product. In the past  
many dealers have been opposed to  
the sale of skim milk on the routes,  
fearing that it would curtail the con-  
sumption of whole milk. It is be-  
lieved, however, that many people, if  
they had an opportunity, would use  
skim milk for cooking and drinking,  
in addition to their customary quan-  
tity of whole milk. Skim milk sold  
in this way should be pasteurized  
and hauled as carefully as market  
milk. It should also be labeled con-  
sequently to comply with local re-  
quirements, so that the customer may  
be fully informed as to its true  
character. Skim milk contains all the  
fat. It has a little more protein than  
whole milk, but because of the defi-  
ciency in fat, does not supply so  
much energy. When 4 per cent  
whole milk—an average butterfat  
content of market milk—sells at 12  
cents a quart, skim milk is worth  
12.4 cents a quart as a source of  
protein. In energy value skim milk  
is worth 6.3 cents a quart when 4  
per cent whole milk is selling for 12  
cents.

**Poultry**  
It is not necessary to build ex-  
pensive poultry houses, but they  
should be serviceable, fairly roomy,  
well lighted, and well ventilated,  
without draft. The floor should be  
objectionable to the neighborhood.  
There will be no disagreeable odors  
if dropping boards are provided in  
the chicken house and these are  
cleaned daily. The noise of the male  
bird is as unnecessary as the male  
himself in a flock kept for eggs.  
Hens lay just as well without the  
male. As it is better to have a cold  
dry poultry house than a warm, damp  
one, some means of ventilation should  
be provided. A cloth curtain over an  
opening has proved a very success-  
ful method of ventilation. If the  
poultry yards are to be on only one  
side of the house, they should be lo-  
cated on the south side in order that  
the fowls may have the benefit of the  
first dry ground in early spring and  
the warmth from the reflection of the  
sun on the best house during the winter.

The fact that rabbits are a cheap  
substitute for the ordinary meats is  
likely to turn the attention of many  
more persons to rearing them now,  
especially in the United States De-  
partment of Agriculture believe.  
They can be kept in small and in-  
expensive pens and buildings and like  
poultry, can be killed and prepared  
for the table on short notice.

The deer, because of the number of  
beef cattle in the United States, with  
the resulting high prices which have  
prevailed during recent years, has  
caused greater interest to be taken  
in the deer industry, and many men who  
have never raised deer cattle in the  
past are taking up this kind of work.  
Young pigs should be given their  
feed in such a manner that each in-  
dividual pig gets its share. The  
simplest way to accomplish this is to  
allow the pigs to eat from a prop-  
erly constructed feed trough; one that  
will keep the pigs out of the feed  
and will lessen the possibility of  
crowding.

Much of the excellence of the rab-  
bit as food depends upon the cook-  
ing. As often prepared, it is dry and  
insipid, while in the hands of an ex-  
perienced cook it becomes what is as  
palatable as the finest poultry. A  
special requirement in cooking is  
that none of the natural juices in the  
meat be lost in the process.
