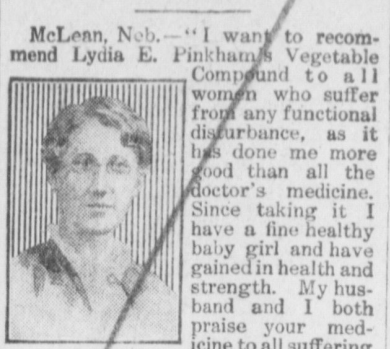
Sumpman-Royer

Farmers Column

Items in These Columns Are Prepared in the Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C., and Are Reliable and Trustworthy.

Investigations in the protein of kaffir, conducted by the Bureau of Chemistry, United States Department of Agriculture, indicate that the germ and endo-sperm closely resemble those of corn. The germ contains oil. The bran, however, it is found, has in it a waxy material which makes it different from that of corn. The chemist, however, think that the results indicate that it might be possible to obtain by proper milling kaffir products analogous to the commercial corn products.

Three more United States food leaflets, the war time food messages issued jointly by the Food Administration and the Department of Agriculture, recently have been added to the seven already published. They are "Vegetables for Winter," "Plenty of Potatoes" and "Instead of Meat." As with the first leaflets issued, the Department of Agriculture with the funds at its disposal, will be able to supply these leaflets directly only to leaders and active workers in the food conservation movement.

Early Spring—as soon as you can get into the garden—is the time to set the "everbearing" strawberries. With such an early start a larger crop of fruit can be obtained the first year. The plants also have opportunity to become established and to establish better root systems before beginning to fruit. The markedly different behavior of the long season varieties has led to the development of cultural practices differing in special details from those followed in the production of standard sort. Direction for the culture of the ever bearing type, in so far as the methods differ from ordinary practices with strawberries, are given in Farmers' Bulletin 901 of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Corn, on a given area, will produce more human food than any other crop commonly known on American farms. This crop heads the list in units of energy produced per acre and is ahead of all other crops except navy beans and soy beans in tissue-building material. In the latter element, soy beans far outclass all other crops, showing twice as much protein per acre as navy beans, which rank second in this regard. The dairy cow is the most efficient of farm animals in the production of human food (milk) and the hog is the most efficient in the conversion of grain into meat, producing five times as much per acre of crops as does any other animal.

When the pigs are about five weeks old, they will begin to taste some of their mother's feed. Do not be in a hurry to wean them. Eight weeks is young enough to wean them, if there is skim milk for them. Of course the size and development has a great deal to do with their weaning age. If skim milk is not obtainable, it is better to let the pigs nurse the sow until ten weeks old. Skim milk and corn, or skim milk and shorts, fed in the proportion of 3 to 1, make an excellent ration for weanlings. If skim milk is not available, a mixture of five parts corn meal, 4 parts middlings, and 1 part tankage, fed as a thin slop, is very good. Good succulent pasture is always beneficial. It will add wonderfully in putting growth on the young pigs, and the grain expense will be lessened. After a litter of pigs has been weaned and are eating well, the most difficult part of their care is over.

LOOKS LIKE GOOD PLAN

Litzitz Bank Backs a Scheme for Raising Pigs and Calves

The Farmers' National Bank of Litzitz is advocating and financing a plan for increasing the crop of pork and beef through the work of pig and calf clubs among boys and girls in villages and on farms.

"Any boy or girl between the ages of 10 and 19 can join the clubs, which is done by filling out an application blank, showing their qualifications and facilities for the raising of stock.

Farm Agent Bucher will be the purchasing agent and secure pure bred stock. The bank will furnish money to the boys and girls on notes approved by their parents. Once a year a sale will be held and the purchase price of animal and 5 per cent interest on the notes is to be repaid, the young people getting the benefit of all the grain made in the calves and pigs.
