MORE FOOD IS NEEDED, SAYS

SECRETARY HOUSTON In spite of the large production in many directions during 1917, the situation is not satisfactory. The supply of wheat in this nation and in the world is inadequate. Owing to short crops in preceding years the reserves of a number of important commodi-ties have been greatly reduced. Whether the war continues or not the demands of this country, because of the increasing population and of the needs of Europe, will be great. They will continue to be great for a considerable period, even after peace returns. There will be an especially strong demand made on this country for meats and live stock.

NATION STILL NEEDS GREAT POULTRY INCREASES

Poultry production should be creased greatly, according to the De-partment of Agriculture's 1918 agri-cultural production program, es-pecially in backyards and on farms where waste material is available and the purchase of expensive grains and other material is not required. Increased poultry production may be obtained most economically, according to the Federal experts, by early hatching, by conlining mother hens at least ten days after the chicks are natched, by reducing loss on account of rats, weasels and thieves, and cold, damp conditions, by thorough sanita-tion, by discouraging the marketing of early hatched pullets as broilers, by eliminating non-producing hens and keeping good layers through at least two laying seasons, and by the poultry man raising his own feed as

OATMEAL COOKIES FOR LUNCHES '

Oatmeal cookies, a toothsome and wholesome sweet for the school lunch, may be made of 1 egg, one-third cup granulated sugar, 1 cup rolled qats, two teaspoons melted fat, 14 teaspoonful salt. Beat the eggs, and story are gradually and stir in add sugar gradually, and stir in other ingredients. Drop a spoonful at a time on a well-greased tin and bake in a moderate oven. KEEP UP BIG POTATO CROPS.

ADVISE FEDERAL SPECIALISTS The normal acreage of Irish and weet potatoes should be maintained in 1918 notwithstanding the large crops in 1917, the Department of Agriculture believes. This is especially true in view of the necessity of releasing more wheat for export. Potatoes, both Irish and sweet, are the most popular and most generally used of the perishable table crops. The Department, through its extension and production of the perishable table crops. sion and publication activities, is en-couraging their greater use, especial-ly the use of the Irish potato, as a partial substitute for wheat in bread making. The yield per acre can be made more certain by greater atten-tion to the selection of disease-free potatoes of good varieties, by treatment of seed potatoes immediately before planting, and by the use of sprays to prevent loss by blight.

WAYS TO THE 15 PER CENT HOG INCREASE

Pork production, to attain the 15 per cent. increase declared needed during 1918, according to the agricultural production program recently announced by the Department of Agriculture, will be increased economically by breeding for two litters as year, by saying through better care. nomically by breeding for two litters a year, by saving through better care a larger number of the pigs farrowed, by growing pasture and forage crops, by using wastes, especially town and city garbage, by proper rations of concentrated feeds, by the use of self feeders, by pasturing alfalfa and other forage legumes and other forage by hogging down grain sor-

crops, by hogging down grain sorghums and corn, by finishing hogs to heavier weights, up to about 275 pounds, and by preventive measures which will keep hogs free from cholera, tuberculosis, other disease and parasites.

APPEAL TO AMERICA TO GIVE CLOTHING FOR THE BELGIANS AND FRENCH

Next week an active campaign in the interest of Belgian Relief will be carried on throughout the United States by the American Red Cross. This will take the form of the collection of old garments and clothing. Two-thirds of this clothing will be given to the Belgians and one-third to the people of devasted Northern France. The Pennsylvania Division is expected to furnish 1,350 tons of these materials and Lancaster and Lancaster County's share, it is hoped, will be large.

For the past several months Miss Frances D. Calder has been the head of the Lancaster Belgian Relief. She will-co-operate with the Red Cross activities in this line, which same Chairman Herbert W. Hartman has placed in charge of H. B. Cochran.

These contributions, while entailing little or no sacrifice for the donors, will mean a great deal to the countries where they are sent. In France and Belgium a great army of women are busy making over such

women are busy making over such garments for the needy, and, while they are busy doing so they forget their own misery to a great extent, while they labor to relieve the need of others.

The articles donated must be of

strong, durable materials, but need not be in perfect repair, as they are re-made largely abroad, as said. Givers are requested to not tribute men's or women's stiff hats women's fancy slippers, goods containing rubber in any form, no damp taining rubber in any form, no damp clothing, all leather goods to be free of mud, and no notes or messages to be placed in the pockets of clothing. Attention is called to the fact that clothing must not be contributed from homes where there has been contagious or infectious disease.

The great need of garments and clothing is illustrated by the fact that in Belgium during the rigors of the Winter just past families of four and five persons were often required to share one blanket in sleeping at night; to have one pair of shoes resoled costs as high as seven dollars. Even the well-to-do in that land are short of necessities, and the poor are in dire need. America, in its plenty, has a particular duty before them in relieving the destitution prevailing. Light, warm, cotton flannel is much needed, as many Belgian mothers have to swathe their new-born babies

have to swathe their new-born babies in rags. Shoes are very much needed; also, bed blankets and sheets. In fact, clothing of all sorts, except those tabooed in a foregoing paragraph. Nothing short of 5,000 tons from America will meet the present situation effectively.
