The issue between the members of the Mount Joy and Columbia borough's all-town teams was definitely settled when we beat the Columbia five on a neutral floor in the Central Hall, Marietta by a score of 41 to 38. Both of these teams had won on their respective floors, and this match at Marietta was played to decide who was the better, as there was been speculation among the basket ball fans of the western section of Lancaster county regarding the matter of the Mt. Joy-Columbia teams.

The clash throughout was nip and tuck, the score being tied 13 times during the game, seven times in the first half and six times during the latter period. The first point to be scored by the Columbians was made on a foul, while the first to be recorded by a Mount Joy player was made on a field goal. During the latter part of the second half the Mount Joy players managed to run away from their opponents.

Garvey, of the same team, was also among the stellar players, as he secured 11 points, having made a field goal and nine out of 21 foul goal shots.
