## THE CELEBRATION IS POSTPONED

### WILL WAIT UNTIL ANOTHER TOLL ROAD IS THROWN OPEN TO FREE TRAFFIC

The proposed celebration of the freeing of the Lancaster and Willamstown and the Lancaster and Harrisburg turnpikes which had been planned by the Lancaster Automobile Club to be held some time next week has been postponed to a more propitious time. That time will be when at least one more toll road will be thrown open to free traffic.

When the negotiations were entered into an appropriation was made from the free highway fund of the State for the purchase of toll roads in Lancaster county, it was expected that in addition to the two roads just freed the Lancaster and Columbia and the Lancaster and Manheim pikes would also be freed. As to the Manheim pike, a meeting of the stockholders has been called to take action on the proposition to sell and as soon as this is taken the negotiations it is expected will be closed and the transfer made.

Negotiations as to the Lancaster and Columbia have been delayed owing to the complications of the long lease on the turnpike by the Conestoga Traction Company, but it is hopefully expected that definite action will be taken within a week or ten days.

With the prospect of having this important highway freed of toll-gates, the committee of the Automobile Club has decided to postpone the big celebration until it can be made still larger by having the Lincoln Highway through the Garden Spot thrown open to free traffic. The announcement of the date will be given.
