ALL YOUNG MEN MUST REGISTER

IF YOU ARE OR WILL BE TWENTY-ONE YEARS OF AGE ON OR BEFORE JUNE FIFTH NINETEEN EIGHTEEN

It is compulsory that all male persons, who have, since June 5th, 1917, and on or before June 5th, 1918, attained their twenty-first birthday, are required to register on June 5th, 1918, between the hours of 7 a. m. and 9 p. m. Any person, who on account of sickness, will be unable to present himself for registration, may apply on or before the day of registration at the office of Local Board No. 1, of this county, for instructions as to how he may register by agent. HEILIG'S BAKERY CLOSED FOR MONTH

PROPRIETOR DID NOT CONFORM WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE GOVERNMENT FOOD ADMINISTRATION

As a penalty for violation of the Food Administration's requirements on the use of substitutes other than wheat flour, the bakery of R. G. Heilig, in this place, was ordered closed by the Federal Food Administrator for Lancaster county, M. E. Bushong yesterday.
 Mr. Bushong gave out the following statement in regard to the action today:
 "The bakery of R. G. Heilig, at Mt. Joy, has been closed for a period of thirty days. Upon investigation, it was found that in his establishment the required amount of substitutes other than wheat flour had not been regularly used for baking purposes, and after a hearing, Marvin E. Bushong, Federal Food Administrator for Lancaster county, ordered the shop closed for a period of thirty days."
 At his home in Elkhart on Wednesday night, Elam H. Hersh, a machinist, died from blood poisoning, symptoms of which first appeared on a burned finger. Mr. Hersh, who lived on Main street, had been sick several days. He was sixty-one years of age and was a member of the United Brethren Church of Elizabethtown. In addition to the wife, the following children survive: Anna, a teacher and Catharine, a housewife; Rebecca, of Philadelphia; Mary, of Lancaster, and Mrs. Phares Hess, of this place. Two brothers also survive, Benjamin, of Donegal and Harry, of Drexville. The funeral will be held on Monday morning at the house at 9:30 o'clock, and at 10 o'clock at Rheems church. Interment was made in Bossler's cemetery. Rev. J. Sellendorff, pastor of the U. B. Church, Elizabethtown, officiated.

Mrs. Elizabeth Murphy of this community was given a severe shock when the death of Mrs. Elizabeth Murphy occurred at the Lancaster General Hospital on Monday morning about 10:30 o'clock. Mrs. Murphy had undergone two severe operations. Deceased is aged 54 years. For the past twenty years she was fore-lady and assistant manager of Herrmann, Aukam & Co's. Industrial Works of this place. She was a member of the Church of God and a devoted christian. Her life was filled with good deeds as she was continually thinking of others and wanting no praise for herself. She is survived by two sons, Paul, Cashier of Atlantic Refining Co., and John, Assistant Cashier of the same company in Harrisburg. Two sisters also survive, The Misses Low and Mayme Kuhns of this place. The funeral was held this afternoon at 3 o'clock from her late residence with interment in the Mount Joy cemetery.

Benjamin S. Dillinger. This entire community was shocked on Sunday evening to learn of the sudden and unexpected death of one of its best known citizens, Benjamin S. Dillinger. He was taken sick suddenly and died after an illness of only seven days, death resulting from crystalline and blood poisoning. Deceased was sixty-four years of age. He was a member of the Lutheran church and in politics was a staunch Republican. He was a member of Cove Lodge No. 301, Knights of Pythias, and held the office of Chancellor; member of Otesego Tribe No. 59, Improved Order of Red Men, of which he was Past Satchem and at the time of his death was one of its trustees; member of Mt. Joy Hall Association for twelve years, of which he was president. Mr. Dillinger was a Councilman of this borough for ten years and served three years as president of the body. He was deputy coroner for a number of years and was also a member of Friendship Fire Company No. 1, of this place. His wife died two years ago. He is survived by the following children: Charles, William and Levi, of this place; one sister, Miss Kate Dillinger, of town and two brothers, Andrew of Harrisburg and Frank, of Coaleda. The funeral was held this morning at ten o'clock from his late residence on East Main street. Interment was made in the Mount Joy cemetery.
