LOCAL DEALER WILL PARTICIPATE IN COUNTY-WIDE MOVEMENT

Mr. H. S. Newcomer announces that during the week of June 10th to 15th, he will participate in a nation wide movement for the promotion of tractor farming and the production of increased foodstuffs from this country.

The idea behind the movement is to impress upon food producers the vital fact that food will win the war and the equally vital necessity of ordering farm implements and machinery in advance of the customary fall ordering time in order to insure having the machinery when it is needed for various farm operations.

National Oliver Week is closely akin to the Department of Agriculture's activity in emphasizing the importance of early ordering this year. The Department points out that the delivery of farm implements is often delayed in transit, terminal and transfer points, and that this year the situation is likely to be aggravated under the stress of war shipments.

The importance of early ordering of farm machinery and implements cannot be too greatly emphasized. "It will be necessary to alleviate these conditions," says the Department of Agriculture, "for the farmers to inform the dealers at the earliest possible moment what they desire in the line of farm machinery during the 1918 crop season."

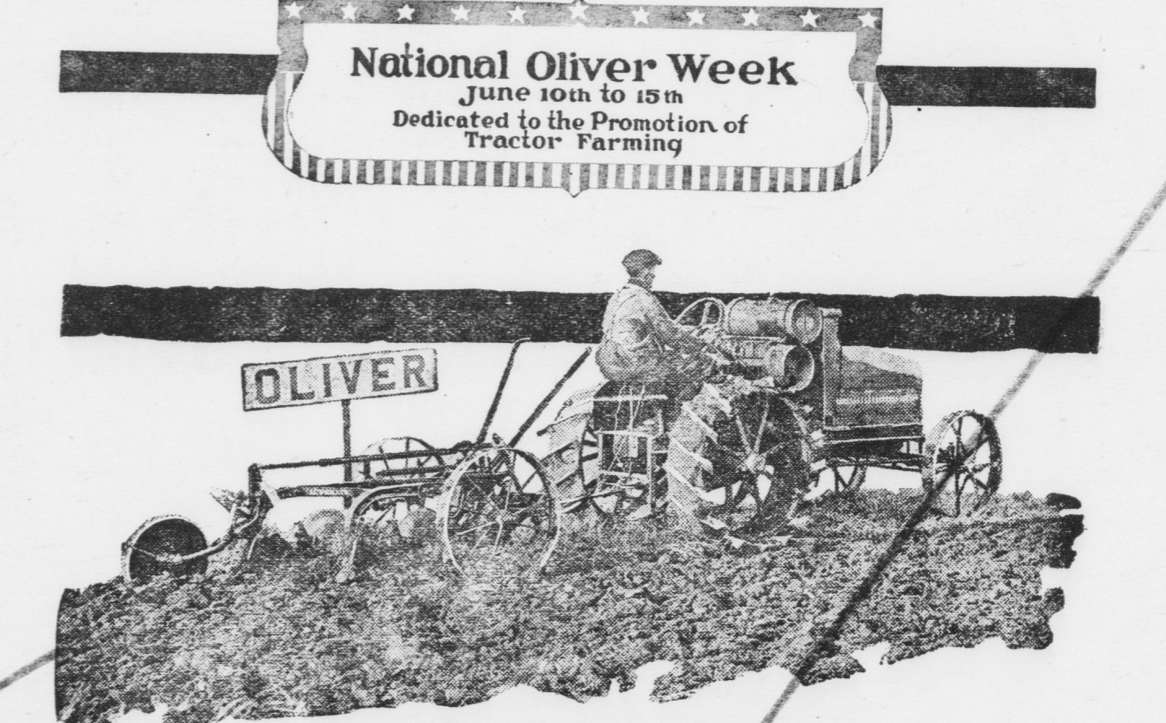
