Mr. and Mrs. Eli Musser and his parents and Mrs. Martin Musser autored to Yoe, York county, on Sunday to attend a funeral.

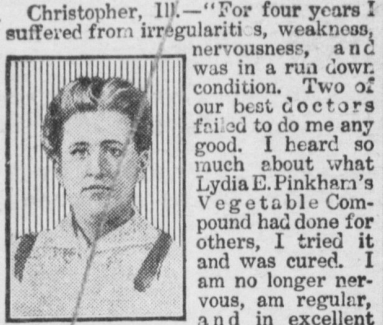

All three are from this village. EAST PETERSBURG BRANCH DOING EXCELLENT WORK The East Petersburg Branch of the American Red Cross is doing good work. Nine boys have been furnished with knitted outfits. The following articles have been made for the Lancaster chapter. Eighty-nine hospital shirts, twenty-nine pairs of pajamas, seventy-one handkerchiefs, ninety tea towels, three convalescent robes, eighty-one napkins, twenty tea cloths, twenty-four table cloths, six button bags, four hospital napkins, six bed socks, thirty-four needle books, seventy-eight sweaters, thirty-one helmets, thirty-seven pairs wristlets, twelve pairs socks, six bands, nine scarfs, four baby blankets. They have pledged themselves to make many of the 1,000 hospital shirts needed by August 20.
