your wife is living, her name should be stated. If you are single or your wife is dead, you should state the name of your nearest blood relative. If you are not married and have no blood relatives the name of a close friend should be stated.

Question 20. Address of nearest relative—In stating the address give the number and name of the street first, then the city or town, then the county and State, or R. F. D. number first, then postoffice, then county and State.

The registrar will ask the registrant if he receives his mail at a place other than that designated as his present permanent home address in answer to question 2. If he answers that he receives it at some other place (that is, by general delivery, at a postoffice box in care of some other person at some other address, etc.) the registrar shall state such place in full, which shall be entered by the registrar under the registrant's signature.

The registrant's signature or mark is placed by him at the bottom of the card in a blank space opposite the statement, "I affirm that I have verified above answers and that they are true."

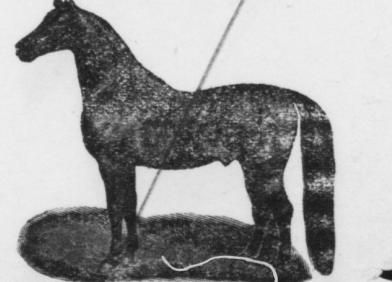
