## THIEVES ROB A HOME FOR THE SECOND TIME

Thieves entered the home of Amos Wolgemuth on Friday night about 1 o'clock and took drybeef, eggs, etc. They entered the basement of the house by prying the lock open with the aid of a wrench which they secured at the tenant house, having stopped there before entering the Wolgemuth home. They traveled by automobile and making considerable noise in their departure, attracted the attention of neighbors.

It is also believed that they stopped at the home of Isaac Giveler, who resides nearby, before they had gone to the other two places mentioned above as was shown by traces left behind.

This is not the first time thieves have prowled about in that section, as just about three months ago the Wolgemuth house was entered. Suspicion has been aroused and the people in that vicinity should all be on the lookout for the guilty ones.

## NOT GUILTY, BUT HAD TO PAY ALL THE COSTS

Harry Simpson and Theodore Roosevelt Jackson, two colored youths of this place, were placed on trial at court Friday, charged by Albert Emerson with felonious assault and battery.

Emerson testified that the two defendants, accompanied by two other colored men, Hugh Ford and Harry Way, assaulted him while he was sleeping in a shed at Rheems on the morning of July 21. He claimed that one of them hit him on the head with a piece of pipe and then attempted to rob him. They ran off without getting anything.

The defendants both denied that they attacked the prosecutor. A verdict of not guilty, with costs imposed upon the defendants, was rendered by the jury.

He was born in 1857, and was in the sixty-first year of his age. He taught school for nine terms in Manheim, Rapho and East Hempfield townships. He was married in 1882 to Miss Elizabeth Minnich, who survives him. After marriage he commenced farming in the Workman homestead where he resided at the time of his death. He leaves to survive him besides a widow, five children: Charles, Walter, Frank, Mattie and Elizabeth, all of whom are in the Workman family in Manheim. He was a member of Trinity Reformed Church, of East Petersburg. The funeral was held this morning.

Mrs. I. Oliver Fry  
Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Fry, wife of I. Oliver Fry, cashier of the First National Bank of Bainbridge, died very suddenly at her home in that place Friday evening. For the past two or three years Mrs. Fry had not been in her usual robust health, but the end came very unexpectedly, heart disease being the cause attributed by the attending physician.
