COMMUNICATED

Editor Bulletin: Having been in close touch with our local Board of Health since the beginning of the epidemic, I feel that no one knows more how to appreciate what has been done here to protect our people from its terrible effects. We have a splendid and efficient Board, who quickly saw their duty and performed it without fear or favor. They safeguarded our lives by such an extension that the disease was held back for a long time in its worst forms, heartily co-operating with our local physicians and the State Department of Health.

The secretary of the Board simply abandoned his own private business affairs and devoted his whole time to the executive work of the Board. Then how much we owe to the devotion of our local physicians for their faithful and untiring response to the call of the sick. Unlike some members of the profession in other places, who charged exorbitant fees, profiteering in human lives, they responded day and night, as long as they could keep on their feet, and in many cases without money and without price.

Yes, we have reason to be proud of our Board of Health and our physicians, and in honoring them we honor ourselves.

Great credit is due our store keepers and the hotel men of the town for loyally carrying out the decrees of the Board of Health.

Perhaps one reason why the epidemic was not so frequently fatal here as in other municipalities is because we have a clean town, for a long time the cleanest town in the state. If other towns are as clean today, it is not because less attention has been paid to our hygienic condition, but because other towns have profited by our example and experience. Years ago the borough authorities with the hearty co-operation of the people, instituted a systematic and periodical "cleaning up," which has been adopted throughout the country. In this we have been amply repaid as the mortality reports will verify.

Much of our sickness and the deaths were due to the fact that many convalescents, in spite of the requests of the Board of Health, persisted in going about congregating in various parts of the town, in stores and visiting in homes where no cases had as yet developed. No blame can be placed upon the Board for this, it was their duty to prevent it. A large number of people would have rebelled if a rigid quarantine had been placed upon homes where the disease existed. The Board left it to the good sense of the people to be careful, after proper warning. But there are always those who are lacking.

Neither the Board of Health, nor our physicians, need or desire any spectacular thanks for their fidelity to duty, but it cannot be amiss to let them know that their efforts are appreciated.

Our local Board of Health has shown its good sense by loyally co-operating with and strictly obeying the mandates of Dr. Royer, Acting Commissioner of Health.

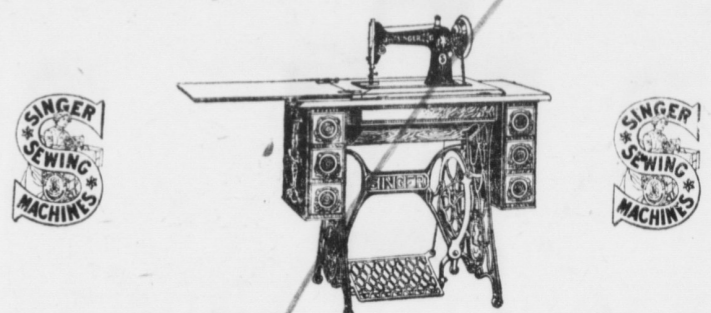
