Their line-up included Kid Ellis, former promising young boxer and foot ball player, of Mount Joy; Brown, of Lafayette College; Grissinger, a County League star; Zellers, of Williamson Trade School, and Dearbeck, of the Westinghouse League. 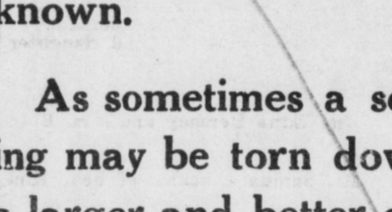
