What Shuilkey Bumblebeek Has To Say This Week

Unanimously elected president of the Lancaster Automobile Club at its annual meeting on Friday evening at Hotel Brunswick, Lancaster, Prof. S. Edward Gable upon assuming the chair expressed the hope for the abolition of toll on more turnpikes of the county and a hundred per cent. improvement in the dirt roads. In addition to these hopes President Gable expects that during the next year the membership of the club will be increased to 2,500. The present membership is nearly two thousand and with the election of ninety new members at the annual meeting a big stride was taken in reaching the new president's goal. President Gable declared the automobile club is the most influential organization in Lancaster county and that it truly deserves paramount credit for the free and good roads obtained.

A communication was received from the citizens of Berwynville denouncing the bad condition of the New Holland turnpike, which they termed was almost impassable. Request was made that complaint be entered through the club and it was decided to refer the matter to the Board of Directors.

A delegation was also present from the North Lancaster Good Roads Association to complain of the bad condition of the Clay and Hingtowntown turnpike. The club's aid was asked to effect a condemnation of the road and the securing of a State aid road from Ephrata to Reading. It was decided to appoint a committee to organize for the proper procedure to be adopted and to employ a competent engineer and a photographer to secure evidence.

Report was made by Secretary Forney of the theft of two automobiles belonging to club members and of their prompt recovery by the Lancaster police. A resolution was adopted in which the fidelity and ability of the police was recognized.

D. F. Magee, county commissioner, in an address to the club stated that the survey of the Southern End road is under way and that some changes will be made to reduce grades and strengthen curves.

The following was the result of the election for officers: President, Prof. S. Edward Gable; first vice president, Aaron B. Landis; second vice president, Frank M. Abel; treasurer, Dr. Wm. H. Trout; secretary, Joseph G. Forney; directors, city district, Daniel W. Sheaffer, Charles M. Reiling, B. Frank Beckman; northern district, Charles A. B. Zook and Benjamin Hoffman; southern district, Levi F. McAllister and George D. Briantall. Benjamin G. Atlee retires after three years as president, the by-laws limiting service to three years. He will devote his entire time to his rapidly growing practice.

Through S. A. Keene, game warden, and the State Game Commission the Khetel Rod and Gun Club of Marietta, on Tuesday afternoon received a consignment of one dozen quail. Wednesday Messrs. W. H. Ritzbach, W. H. Fendrick, Dr. E. Y. Sultz, Karl Klump and Charles Slinger distributed pairs of them throughout East Donegal and Conoy townships, on farms they considered best suited for the propagation of game. The Habacker farm, the Mamma farm, Cameron's farm, the Meyer farms, the Casse's Park farm and Abram Engle's farm. This week they will liberate three troupes of English ring neck pheasants, which were received through the same agency. They have been in the care of Otto Hecht, in West Marietta, for some time. Just where they will be liberated has not yet been fully determined, but announcement will be made later as the club members generally do not do things under cover. There is a bare possibility that a few grey hare may be gotten later, but the prospects are not bright because an individual turned back a consignment of another sort of hare earlier.

**FARMERS' COLUMN**

Items in These Columns are Prepared in the Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C., and are Reliable and Trustworthy.

**DETAILS OF DISINFECTATION**

In the practical work of disinfection there are three essentials:

1. Preparation of the building that will facilitate reaching organisms of disease.
2. Disinfectant which upon contact can be depended upon to destroy such organisms.
3. A method of applying the disinfectant that will assure the most thorough contact with the bacteria.

**COOPERATION IMPORTANT FACTOR IN CONTROL OF DISEASE**

Prevention and eradication of diseases of domestic animals, as well as of the human race, should be matters of public interest.

On the wholesomeness of food, and especially of meats and dairy products, depends in large measure the health and vitality of every one. With the improvement of animal-breeding methods, with increased value of live stock and larger individual herds, diseases become more important problems than formerly in live stock raising.

Tuberculosis of cattle and swine, hog cholera, and the Texas-fever tick are among the principal sources of loss which the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture is endeavoring to reduce through vigorous campaigns of education and regulation.

The principal diseases can be prevented or controlled by practical methods now in use and which have resulted in marked progress.

The rate of progress, however, depends largely on the support of the work by live-stock growers, public officials, educational leaders, the press, and all others interested in the Nation's economic welfare, public health and an ample supply of wholesome meats and dairy products.

The public's cooperation with the Bureau of Animal Industry will strengthen its efforts in eradicating live-stock diseases and improving the quality and economical yield of animal food products.

Every farmer should be his own fire inspector rather than his own fire chief, says a Department of Agriculture bulletin on fire prevention.

**GIVE COWS PALITABLE FEED**

Palitability is of great importance in successful feeding. The best results can not be obtained with any feed which is not well relished by the cow; consequently any unsuitable feed to be used should be mixed with those that are appetizing.

There are many advantages to be gained when the stock raisers of one community raise the same breed. Better prices may be secured from the sale of a uniform product and suitable breeding stock can be secured near home.

**CHICKS LIKE VARIETY RATIONS**

Chicks like eggs, Johnny cakes, pinhead oatmeal, rolled oats, stale bread, as well as milk mash. As the young fowls get older and stronger the number of meals may be decreased and the amount of food for each meal may be increased. Cracked corn, cracked peas, broken rice and charcoal, millet or rape seed may finally be added to the chicken meal.

**HAVE THE BROODER READY**

Buyers of chicks should have a brooder such as is required for the number of chicks bought ready, ready to use and regulated when the chicks arrive.

If, for any reason, the brooder is not ready, take the chicks from the shipping box in a warm room; feed, and return to the box; repeat at intervals of three hours until the brooder is ready.

For the first few days give very close attention to regulating the brooder for the comfort of the chicks. This is the most important feature in the operation of a brooder, and the most critical period in the life of the chick.

Much food is thrown away because so many parents do not know how to utilize leftovers or will not take the trouble to keep and prepare them. Left-over cereals can be reheated or combined with fruits, meats, or vegetables into appetizing side dishes. Even a spoonful of cereal is worth saving to thicken soup, gravy, or sauce.
